

CITY-COUNTY PLAN VIEWED ON CLEAN-UP

City-county cooperation in cleaning up the Old Fort road, where rubbish has been spilled along the public highway, was discussed at Monday night's meeting of the city council.

County Commissioner Jack Benner told the council the county court is willing to cooperate in a clean-up, furnishing county trucks for the work. The street committee was given power to act in attempting to work out an arrangement. Use of prisoners on the job and volunteer help from residents of the affected district were two suggestions made.

The council adopted a new plan for the cemetery whereby contractual use of plots is forbidden. Hereafter, the city will do whatever work is done on the plots, and persons wishing to arrange for this work will get in touch with the police judge's office, which will keep money for this work in a separate fund. Councilman Cantrell suggested the plan.

Complaint about a dairy at 2439 Orchard avenue was referred to Dr. Calvin Hunt, city food inspector.

N. B. Drew, owner of a building in which the Oriental cafe is operated, appeared before the council in connection with a recent order from the council that a window in the cafe be bricked up, following a complaint from a resident of a nearby apartment. The council had held up Lee Wong's application for a restaurant license for the cafe.

There was a long discussion, in which some of the councilmen contended that the resident of the apartment would have to realize he is living in a business district and must expect noise. When it was stated there are sometimes early morning dining parties in the cafe which arouse the complainant from his sleep, Councilman Montgomery said:

"He ought to get up and join the party."

The outcome was that the council granted the restaurant license, pointing out that the apartment resident's recourse might be through nuisance charges. Bricking up the window was not required, but the restaurant operator has installed double windows to check the noise.

After a short but spirited discussion, the council authorized \$5 out of the recreation fund as a contribution toward a recent church league basketball dinner.

To the light committee was referred an application for a light at Roseway drive and Lakeview street.

The Klamath Veteran

The 1939 annual report of the Veterans Administration gives us some very interesting figures on veteran pensions.

According to this report, which is official and authentic, less than ten per cent of those who served in the armed forces of the United States during the World war are receiving compensation in any form.

Of this ten per cent, approximately seven-eighths are being compensated for service-connected disabilities.

Only about one-eighth of those who are now receiving compensation have been unable to prove their disabilities are service-connected.

These veterans are, in every case, permanently and totally disabled. The report shows that as of June 30, 1939, government compensation was being paid to a total of 342,072 veterans suffering from disabilities received in service. (Approximately 4,500,000 men were enrolled in America's armed forces during the war.)

Only \$2,936 totally disabled World war veterans receiving compensation were non-service-connected cases. The latter were receiving \$30 per month each unless reduced to \$6 while receiving institutional care at government expense, and in the absence of dependents.

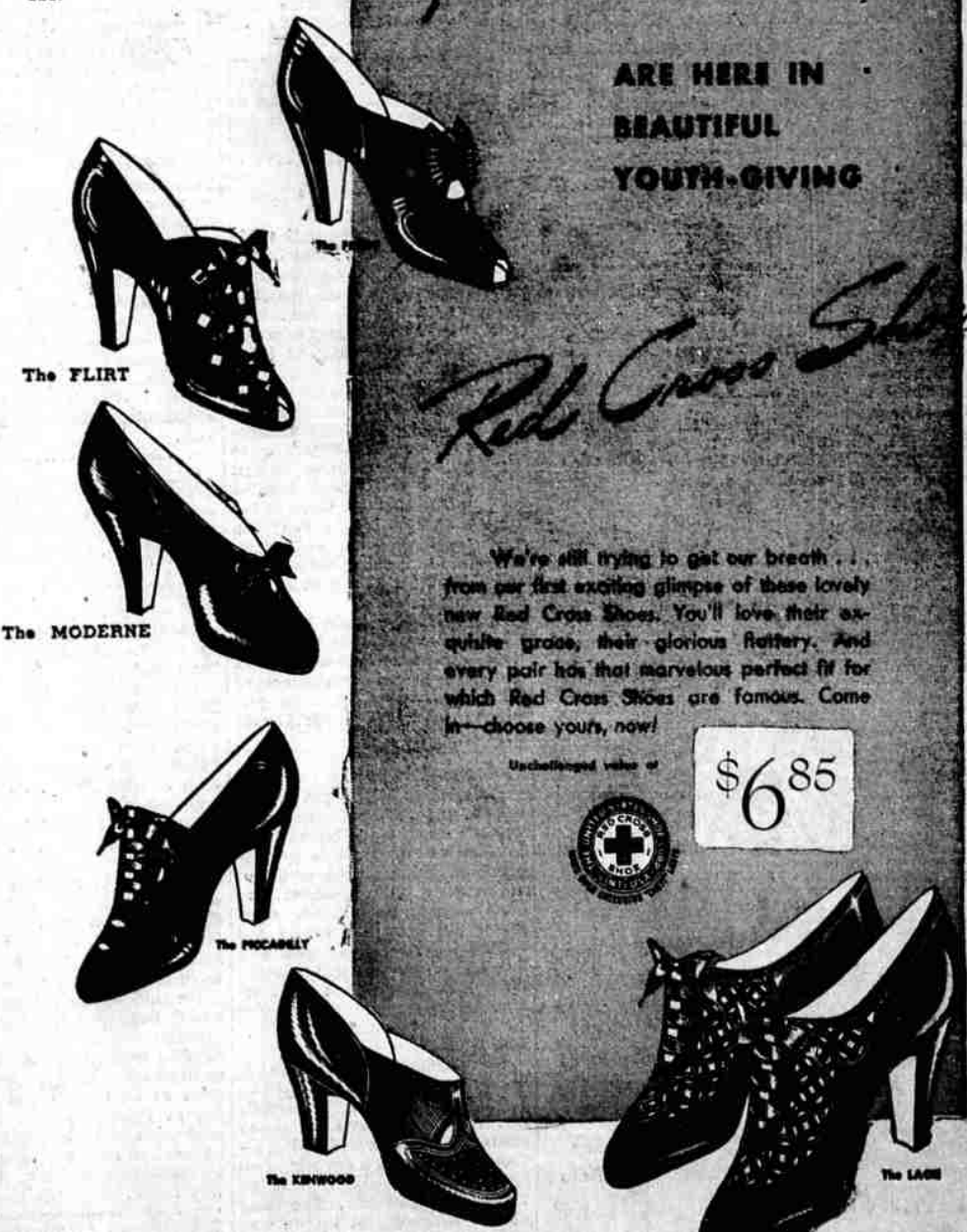
