My Fellow Countrymen:

It is with great pleasure that I avail myself of this opportunity to express to you my deep and abiding appreciation of the support and assistance which you have given me in my long and arduous efforts to bring under proper control those powerful forces of organized vice and crime which not so long since were exploiting the toiling masses of this county, and which then spread distress, misery and sorrow where happiness and security now abound in a larger and fuller measure.

Long years of experience in public affairs, constant study and observation hath revealed unto me that the chief interest and most serious concern of every individual worthy of being called a man is the security of his home, the happiness of his loving wife, and the future of his children. As Judge of your Court, I shall strive in the future, as I have striven in the past, to strengthen those sacred ties of home and fireside which God hath woven in such ample folds around the heart of America.

I shall continue at all times to hold the interests of the home life of this community paramount to the powerful interests of the underworld which seek to plunder, profane and disinherit the boyhood and girlhood of this state and nation.

As Judge of your Court, I again dedicate my services to a nobler ideal of citizenship, and shall strive to promote a finer and nobler conception of the responsibilities of citizenship, that the sacrifices made by the mothers of this county, of this state and of this nation shall not have been made in vain, but that the mothers of this county and of this state may have assurance that the children for whom they have sacrificed and suffered so much shall not be plundered, impoverished and exploited, but that they may enjoy in a fuller measure the blessing and the glories of this great civilization, which they, the mothers of this nation, have builded.

As Judge of your Court, I shall continue in the future as I have in the past, to assist, support and sustain those public officials of honor and integrity who have dedicated their time and talents to promote the public weal, and I shall continue to oppose and expose, not with timidity but with boldness and courage, those individuals calling themselves public servants, who align themselves with the underworld and who seek to enrich themselves by the exploitation of the toiling farmers' legitimate business and industry.

I shall continue in the future, as I have in the past, to dedicate the best and choicest services of heart and brain to advance and promote the interests of those who toil, that the toiling masses of our county and state shall not go through life crushed in spirit, broken in body, hopeless in soul; doomed to neglect in old age and to die the death of an outcast, but that they who toil may in the fullness of time enjoy the fullest application of that great American ideal of social justice, which embraces within its broad scope financial stability and economic security for the man who toils as well as for the merchant prince and the captains of industry. I shall ever labor to secure a more adequate provision for the care and maintenance of those men and women who by old age have been removed from the ranks from which modern industry selects and replenishes its workers.

No matter how many furies may frown or how fierce may be the bludgeonings of fate, I shall continue with a persevering faith to cling to those ideals which those great Americans who have gone before us gave unto us for inspiration, and for our guidance; ideals which they bequeathed unto us as our greatest national heritage; ideals, the practical application of which, in the home and in the halls of state, hath enabled us to become a great nation and a great people.

As Judge of your Court, I shall not sit cringing, trembling and fawning before the threats and menacing frowns of the powerful lords of the underworld, but I shall wield a keen blade in repelling

every assault by those who seek to impose their sharp yet hidden injustices upon the home builder, the merchant, the farmer, (upon whom falls the burden of taxation,) and the man who toils in the woods, in the mills, in the factories and on the rails.

I shall continue, in the future as I have in the past, to study the problems which confront railroad labor that I may intelligently serve them, standing at all times fully equipped and prepared to step forward, with promptness and with courage, to assist them in repelling every assault made upon their interests by those powerful forces of Wall Street, which dominate and control the transportation facilities of our nation. Our community can be best served by our public officials laboring to promote the interests of railroad labor and other workers, who support and sustain the legitimate business of Main Street, and by refusing to become the subservient tools of the powerful financial dictators of Wall Street.

As Judge of your Court, I shall ever be mindful of the fact that if our community is to experience a resumption of prosperity, that such resumption can only come when honest investments, honestly made, are afforded proper protection, and when the proud plumes of smoke from the eager fires of our industries are backward blown, when our forests ring with the harmonious din of the woodsmen's ax, when our mills resound with the melodious hum of whirling saws, and when the flockmaster and the cattle man, who tend their flocks and herds beneath the wintry stars and scorching summer sun, and when the tiller of the soil, who tickles the earth with the plow that she may laugh forth her golden harvest, are all assured that the rewards of their prudence and honest toil shall not be filched from them by those powerful yet hidden forces, seeking to use the Government itself and the officials thereof for the exploitation and impoverishment of the farmer and stockman.

It is sad, if not tragic indeed, to observe men seeking public preferment, manifesting such grave solicitude for the welfare of the operators of the big gambling dens, yet who have neither the courage nor the statesmanship to utter a single syllable in behalf of the teachers in our schools, for whom our state has never made any adequate provision for their retirement in old age. It is tragic indeed to see the dealers in the big gambling dens as they grind forth their daily grist of human agony, receiving for their illegal services compensation greater than is paid to our teachers into whose hands has been consigned the duty and important task of molding the character of our children who are to become the citizens of our nation in the years that are yet to come.

As Judge of your Court, I shall continue in the future, as I have in the past, to avail myself of every opportunity to labor for the advancement of the interests of that courageous band of men and women who have dedicated and who are dedicating their lives to keeping aglow in the brain of man the lamp of genius and learning; if our great republic is to survive down through the coming ages, the patriotism of its citizens must be not only sentimental, but intelligent.

While I am deeply conscious of the fact that I have never been as my opponents have been, or claim to have been, endowed with those divine and superlative attributes of infallibility, it is only meet and proper for me to say that I shall simply strive in the future, as I have striven in the past, to live a life of truth, standing for justice, for law and for order, continuing at all times to align myself with the forces of common decency and good government, standing at all times ready and unafraid to face the iron storm of the organized opposition of organized crime and those who form powerful combinations for the exploitation of their fellowmen.

While the dark and sinister clouds of the greatest depression this world has ever known hung menacingly over this nation the heads of Klamath in-

dustry labored with patriotic zeal to keep the fires of industry aglow that the workers might be afforded the means and the opportunity to earn and provide themselves and their families with the necessities of life.

During those tragic years the powerful forces of organized gambling, with staunch greed, intent on prostituting all the powers of the state to their base, selfish and sinister ends, sought to control every public official and every law enforcement agency and, with ruthless and heartless disregard for the welfare of the workers and their families, took from them their earnings as fast as industry could provide the funds with which to meet the payroll.

This powerful faction, small in number but terrible in malignant activity, cherished then as they do now the delusion that governments are ordained and established and officials elected for the sole purpose of affording them protection. This powerful and corrupt faction, in their quest for wealth and power, labor under the delusion that those who toil were created but for the one sole purpose; that they may fleece them, plunder them, impoverish them, prey upon them and destroy them!

As Judge of your Court, scorning all bribes, wearing no chains and ignoring all threats, I shall continue in the future, as I have in the past, to hold the interests of the workers and their families paramount to the interests of this powerful oligarchy, who would undermine the very foundations of society and subvert the very Government itself to their own selfish ends.

As Judge of your Court, I shall continue in the future, as I have in the past, to hold the interests of the merchants, who provide the workers and their families with food, clothing and other necessities of life, above and paramount to the interests of the operators of the big gambling dens.

It is the merchant who gives unto the worker value received for every dollar received from him, and it is the operator of the gambling den who takes all and gives nothing in return.

History reveals unto the competent student that the merchant, like unto the tiller of the soil, hath ever been on the side of social justice, the post-haster of progress and the friend and champion of human liberty.

History also reveals unto the competent student that since man first crept out of darkness into the dawn of civilization that the gambler hath ever been the corrupter of youth, the destroyer of men, the wrecker of homes, the harbinger of distress, the most powerful enemy of human happiness and the constant and perpetual impediment to the onward march of civilization. The interests of the gambler are always in direct conflict with the interests of the homebuilder, the merchant, the worker and society, and I shall ever stand, as I have ever stood, on the side of common decency, legitimate business and the home.

As Judge of your Court, I shall strive in the discharge of my official duties to tread the paths of righteousness, laboring to promote good and abate evil, that in the silent years that are yet to come you and your children, and your children's children, may enjoy in a fuller measure the blessing of prosperity and dwell in security beside the still waters of happiness and contentment.

SALE OF TIMBER KLAMATH INDIAN RESERVA- TION—BLACK HILLS TIMBER UNIT

Sealed bids in duplicate on forms provided therefor, marked outside "Bid, Black Hills Timber Unit" and addressed to the "Superintendent, Klamath Agency, Oregon," will be received until 2 o'clock p. m., Pacific time, April 9, 1940, for the purchase of the merchantable timber estimated to be about one hundred and nine million (109,000,000) feet, more or less, principally ponderosa pine on a tract within the Klamath Indian Reservation, Oregon, described as the Black Hills Timber Unit, embracing approximately 33,700 acres of tribal and allotted lands, of which about 19,400 acres of tribal land and about 3,500 acres of allotted lands are timbered. Separate approved contracts covering the estimated 12,500,000 feet of pine standing on allotted lands must afterwards be made with allottees if they desire to sell and on terms similar to the contract for unsold timber. Each bid must state the price per thousand feet, B. M., Scribner Decimal C Log Scale, that will be paid for timber cut. No bid will be considered for less than \$3.25 per thousand feet, B. M., for ponderosa and sugar pines, \$1.50 for Douglas fir and incense cedar, and \$0.75 for other species. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check in the amount of \$12,000 on a solvent National Bank, payable to the Special Disbursement Agent, Klamath Indian Agency, Oregon. The deposit will be returned to unsuccessful bidders. The deposit of the successful bidder will be applied as part of the purchase price against timber actually cut on this unit only, or retained as liquidated damages if the bidder shall not execute contract and furnish satisfactory bond for \$20,000 within 60 days from acceptance of his bid. The right to waive technical defects and to reject any and all bids is reserved. The contract will specify that all designated timber shall be cut and removed from the unit prior to March 31, 1945. For copies of the contract, regulations, map of sale area, blanks for the submission of bids and other information, apply to the Superintendent,
