HEARINGS SET NEXT 2 DAYS ON BUS ISSUE

The first of two hearings on bus operations will be held in the city council chamber Thursday beginning at 9 a. m.

At that time the public utilities commissioner's staff will receive information in connection with a proposal of Fred Duke to operate buses over a number of streets in Klamath Falls, including a route to Shipplington and other north end points, and along California and Conger avenues.

It is expected the city of Klamath Falls will be represented at the hearing to the extent that the city's franchise arrangements with the Klamath Bus company will be made known to the PUC.

On Friday in the council chambers another hearing will be held on the conflicting schedules between the bus company and Duke on lines operating into the suburbs south and east of the city.

Some time ago PUC men made a preliminary investigation of this situation, distributing questionnaires among residents of the district.
