AIRCRAFT ON TOP OF GAINS IN STOCK LIST

NEW YORK, March 13 (AP)—Aviation stocks rode out a storm of selling today to emerge as chief gainers in a market made erratic by the sudden Russo-Finnish truce.

The air lines, their shares obtaining public fancy, came to the support of wavering aircrafts and buyers moved in toward the close to help eradicate losses in other sections of the securities field. Transactions totaled about 850,000 shares.

A prediction by Juan T. Trippe, president of Pan American Airways, that the big international line would show earnings of \$2,000,000 for 1939 compared with \$48,872 in 1938 was largely responsible for fractional boosts among the air carriers.

WHEAT PRICE FALLS TWO CENTS BUSHEL

CHICAGO, March 13 (AP)—Wheat prices fell more than 2 cents a bushel today to the lowest level in eight days as the market reflected traders' reaction to receipt of good snows over much of the grain belt and the Russian-Finnish peace. Selling through houses with northwestern and eastern connections led the decline, bringing numerous stop loss orders into execution.

Talk of further peace moves in Europe and the much-needed beneficial moisture received by the spring wheat zone dominated trade developments.

Rallying slightly from the day's lows, wheat closed 1 1/2c lower than yesterday, May \$1.01 1/2, July 99 1/2; corn 1/2c down, May 55 1/2-56, July 56 1/2; oats 1/2c lower.

OREGON SPORT NOTES

The assurance expressed now and then in the northwest that the Atherton abductions in the Pacific Coast conference will hurt most at the University of Southern California meets disagreement in several quarters.

One Washington sports writer says that just the opposite will be the case and that El Trojan will be just as hard to beat after the ex-G-man cleans him up as before.

"Now that the colleges are forbidden to waive tuition payments for athletes, the common belief is that powerful USC is going to be struck a mortal blow. Minus the old pocketbook gesture, the Trojans are judged as impotent as the next school. "But not so. A strong alumni group still operates around Board field. USC can no longer

give an athlete a receipt for tuition without requiring him, or some one, to pay cash on the line. For each athlete there must be something like \$300 paid each year.

"So what is going to happen? The new rule doesn't state that you or I or Joe Glutz can't pay for the ride. Any organization can send in the cash for the boy under the new code and around L. A. \$100,000 can be raised easily to keep the talent coming. Poor Stanford's 'buck-a-month' club, which raises around \$12,000 annually, is going to look like small potatoes, we fear.

"The other schools may suffer where alumni support is weak, but not El Troy. "In other words, the Atherton code takes football away from the alumni in theory and gives it back to the alumni in practice."

BOSTON, March 13 (AP-USA)—Boston wool houses were receiving a little demand for original bag fine territory wools of average to good French combing length today at 85-87 cents, scoured basis. Mills are continuing to show interest in South African Merino wools at steady prices. Country packed lots of three-eighths and one-quarter blood bright fleeces were offered occasionally at 35-37 cents, in the grease, delivered east.

Cochran Upset in Billiard Tourney

CHICAGO, March 12 (AP)—Arthur Rubin of New York City tonight upset Defending Champion Welker Cochran, San Francisco, 50-32 in the \$20,000 world championship three cushion billiard tournament.

It took Rubin, a newcomer to world title play, 52 innings to defeat the veteran Cochran. It left each with one game won and one lost in the 110-game Round Robin tourney matching 11 of the world's leading billiard players. Joe Chamaco, Mexico City, won his opening game tonight when he dealt Art Thurnblad,

Kenosha, Wis., his second defeat, 50-44 in 67 innings. Jay Bozeman, Vallejo, Calif., won his first game by defeating Otto Reisel, Philadelphia, 50-35 in 40 innings. It was Reisel's second defeat.

Allen Hall, Chicago, defeated Tiff Denton, Kansas City, 50-31 in 46 innings. It was Hall's first game; Denton's second defeat.
