

REALTY BOARD TO GIVE TEST HERE APRIL 1

Claude H. Murphy, commissioner of the Real Estate department of the state of Oregon, has announced that the real estate board will hold an examination in Klamath Falls, on Monday, April 1, for applicants desirous of obtaining licenses as real estate brokers or salesmen. This will be the first examination under authority of this department to be held in Klamath Falls. The sessions will be held in the council chamber at the city hall.

The real estate board was established by an act of the legislature adopted by the 1938 session, and became effective when Governor Charles A. Sprague appointed the members. They are W. B. Shively and Will H. Ross of Portland, Lowell Williamson, La Grande, and Carl Y. Tengwald, of Medford, with Commissioner Murphy as the administrator. It is presumed that all members of the board will be present for the Klamath Falls meeting.

Plans of the Klamath Realty board for a regional meeting of realty dealers at a dinner meeting on the evening of April 1, have been announced by R. C. Dale, president of the board, and a program of interest to property owners and business men is being arranged. David B. Simpson, president of the Oregon Association of Real Estate Boards, has assured Murphy that he will attend and is regarded as one of the best informed among Oregon business leaders on subjects of taxation, and property management. Donald Woodward, president of the Portland Realty Board, and T. W. Zimmerman, secretary of the state association, are also numbered among the speakers on the program for the banquet session. It is expected that in addition to applicants for licenses from various southern Oregon towns, there will also be a representative group of real estate dealers from Grants Pass, Medford, Ashland, Merrill, Malin, Lakeview and Bend.
