STOCK MARKET LED HIGHER BY AVIATION BIDS

NEW YORK, March 20 (AP)—Wall Street celebrated the arrival of spring today with an advancing stock market under the leadership of aviation and steel.

Gains of some issues ran around two points toward the close despite a lack of any great buying volume. Transfers totaled about 700,000 shares.

Overnight orders gave promise of a day of action and the opening rises were approximately doubled before the end of the session in spite of flurries of profit-taking at mid-day and near the close.

Heading the forward movement were Boeing, Douglas, United Aircraft, Glenn Martin, Sperry, Curtiss-Wright, North American Aviation, Bendix, Lockheed, Pan American Airways, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Youngstown, Harvester, American Smelting, Kennecott, Phelps Dodge, General Electric, New York Central, Great Northern preferred, Pennsylvania Railroad and Anaconda.

Corporate bonds gained a bit, but U. S. governments slipped. Commodities moved up bricly. Foreign markets were fairly firm, but thin.

WHEAT SHOOTS UP 3 CENTS BUSHEL

CHICAGO, March 20 (AP)—Wheat prices advanced three cents a bushel today to the highest levels in almost a month as the grain market reflected European developments including a British raid on the German air base at Sylt and efforts to form a more aggressive war government in France.

Pessimistic domestic crop conditions also had an influence in the price advance, particularly in the rye pit where forecast of low temperatures in the north-west producing zone attracted attention.

Wheat closed 21-31 cents higher than yesterday, May \$1.051-1.051, July \$1.041-1.031; corn 1-1c up, May 58-1c, July 57-1c; oats 1-1c higher.

GAIN FOR SPUDS SHIPPING POINT PRICES REFLECT

PORTLAND, March 20 (AP)—Potato prices at Deschutes and Klamath shipping points reflect increases in other sections, the agricultural marketing service revealed today.

Deschutes russet Burbanks are quoted at \$1.20 a hundred-weight for No. 1 grade of four ounces and larger and \$1.10 on general run of sizes. Klamath basin shippers are asking \$1 for No. 1 and 75 to 80 cents for No. 2.

Oregon shipments totaled 141 cars last week, a decline of 37 from the previous week.

200 GOATS ROAM AFTER TRUCK UPSET

NORFOLK, Va., March 20 (AP)—In some western parts it might not be a matter of much moment, but in the effete east some 200 scattered goats constitute material enough for a far-flung roundup.

Such a roundup there must be before Jerry Falco of Laurel, Del., gets back the billy-goats and nanny-goats which scampered in all directions when a Delaware-bound double deck trailer overturned on the Suffolk-Portsmouth highway yesterday.

Falco corralled a hundred before they got far, but the rest kept going. Two calves, who escaped in the smashup, went with them.

WOOL MARKET

BOSTON, March 20 (AP)—(U. S. Dept. Agri.)—Scattered lots of domestic wools have been sold in Boston at reduced prices. Fine Delaine bright fleeces have moved at 35-37 cents, grease basis, or 90-92 cents, scoured basis. New clip early shorn fine territory wools of staple combing length have been turned over in original bags at around 88 cents, scoured basis, delivered to mills. The same price was reported to have been accepted on new choice 12-months Texas wools to be delivered when available.
