

GERMAN BASE BLASTED FOR SECOND TIME

(Continued from Page One)

Last night and early today, prevented the Danish coastal observers from estimating accurately the number of planes involved in the follow-up raid.

They said, however, that apparently there were six groups of bombers, with the reverberating explosions equal or nearly equal to those previously, and German anti-aircraft batteries keeping up a terrific defense.

The Danes said they themselves fired warning shots at one foreign plane which flew over Danish soil, and that several bombs were dropped on the coast of Denmark, on which they said one plane landed with spitting machine-guns.

Thirty of the latest types of Wellington and Whitley bombers were believed to have engaged in the raids starting last night, the British Press association reported, although there was no official word of the numbers.

Already, on the strength of glimpses caught by the crews of wheeling bombers in the rainbow glare of battle, the air ministry reported the gigantic raid had destroyed seaplane hangars, a railway, barracks, jetties and concrete ramps.

What the photographs will show and whether the follow-up flights have dropped any more bombs must wait until "all planes have returned" from this latest mission, ministry sources said.

Reports from Tonder, Denmark, said two planes returned to the scene at 9 a. m. (midnight PST) and dropped six bombs, but more than 100 were dropped in the mass raid of last night and early today.

The bright, thunderous crash of bombs, earth-shaking roars that signified destroyed arsenals, and the leaping red flare of burning hangars and shops gave Britain's reply through the night to Saturday's German raid on Scapa Flow.

This was the picture fitted together from air ministry com-

muniques and the accounts of watchers in nearby Denmark. From 1 p. m. (11 a. m. PST) until after 3 a. m., the smashing attack continued. The bark of anti-aircraft guns, the frework of tracer bullets and the blue-white glare of searchlights manned by Sylt's defenders contributed to the nether-world scene.

Residents on the nearby Danish coast, who had impromptu ringside seats, counted at least 82 bomb blasts and said four terrific explosions which made the earth quake beneath their feet undoubtedly were direct hits on great munitions stores.

Four Danish towns suffered from the bombing, the Exchange Telegraph agency reported, but the only damage was to wind-does.

As the smashing raid got well under way, Prime Minister Chamberlain announced the action which was Britain's most spectacular use of her air armada in the 200 days of war.

BERLIN, March 20 (AP)—Informed German sources today challenged the British announcement that last night's raid on the German island of Sylt was a big success, but admitted that it lasted from 8 p. m. till 2:40 a. m. (11 a. m. to 5:40 p. m., PST).

DNB, the official German news agency, described the British announcements as "propaganda action aimed at erasing the pervading impression that the German air force on Scapa Flow (last Saturday) had not only on neutral countries but also in Great Britain."

The DNB report said the British had made no mention of violating Danish territory and dropping incendiary bombs over that country.

(Reports from Danish coastal towns told of several bombs being dropped on Danish soil and the firing of Danish guns at unidentified foreign warplanes.)

The German high command announced that only a "house" was hit. One British plane was said to have been shot down.

The regular communiqué follows:

"In the west no special events. Yesterday about 8 p. m. British planes attacked the island of Sylt. A number of planes continued this attack until 2:40 a. m.

"One house was struck, otherwise, thanks to the German defenses, no damage was done. Most of the bombs fell in the water. One British warplane was shot down by anti-aircraft artillery.

"In connection with this attack the British planes flew over Danish territory."

Mrs. Davis, near collapse at her home, later told officers they would find the body of her mother-in-law at the latter's home.

Officers found Mrs. Arnold's home in neat order. Deputy Sheriff O. K. Bodia said a bloody rag was found in a carton in a closet. Then a blood stain was found on the kitchen floor and the trussed body was found behind the nailed cupboard door.

Coroner's deputies said death apparently occurred Monday. A separate investigation had been started by a police woman at about the same time on the basis of report that Mrs. Redding-Arnold had not reported for work at a downtown department store Monday or Tuesday.

The whimpering dog from which the chain had been taken was found in the locked home.

The warrant listed the alias of W. A. Redding for the son. Ralls said he used the name of his step-father in pawnshoping his mother's wristwatch for \$7 Monday. Redding, whom Mrs. Davis said was the slain woman's fifth husband, was reported to be a resident of McGrath, Alaska.

Mrs. Davis' home was under armed guard today.

Showered Ice Pick Police, issuing a description of Davis, said he had the word, "Mother," tattooed on the upper portion of his right arm. The initials, "USA" were tattooed on the lower right forearm and on the left arm is a tattoo of a cat, the description said. Davis has light complexion, is 5 feet 11 inches tall, weighs 150 pounds and was last seen wearing a dark leather jacket, black trousers and a light grey hat.

Ralls said Mrs. Davis told him Davis showed her an ice pick yesterday. He told her, she said, he intended to use it in killing her as she slept by his side Monday night.

"He said he was going to kill me while I was asleep, then kill himself, but he said he lost his nerve," Mrs. Davis disclosed. "He said he had killed his mother with the ice pick in a quarrel over me."

She said his last words to her were: "I'm going to get a house-keeping room and turn on the gas."

The coroner's office was trying today to contact Mrs. Redding's relatives in Lawton, Oklahoma.

ment usually waits for the envoy who makes a speech to send it in.

Hull told his press conference he had not seen Cromwell's speech nor had the state department seen it before it was made.

Rep. Sweeney (D-Ohio) demanded an investigation and possible recall today of "our playboy minister to Canada" and Rep. Fish (R-N. Y.) requested information on whether Cromwell was expressing the views of President Roosevelt.

Both members delivered their remarks from the house floor, shortly after Sweeney introduced a resolution calling for an inquiry by the foreign affairs committee into whether Cromwell was correctly quoted as criticizing "American isolationists."

JOHN FREDERICK LOOSELEY

John Frederick Looseley, a native pioneer son of Oregon, born at McMinnville, Ore., July 18, 1862, passed away in Medford very suddenly March 19 at 9:30 a. m. Mr. Looseley spent his entire life in Oregon and was educated in the schools of the Willamette valley. He came to Oregon with his parents when he was 10 years of age. They settled at Fort Klamath, Ore., where he spent his youth. He was married to Miss Mary Culbertson at Fort Klamath in November, 1885, five children, who survive him, being born to this union: One daughter, Mrs. Beattie Hartley of Merrill, Ore.; four sons, Forester W. and Claude F. Looseley of Pittville, Calif.; Raymond S. Looseley of Malin, and 14 grandchildren. He is also survived by his wife, Mrs. Mary Looseley of Fort Klamath, Ore. Mr. Looseley was one of the pioneer ranchmen and farmers of Klamath county and was known by a host of friends. Funeral services will be held in the Methodist church at Fort Klamath, Ore., on Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Reverend Mooney officiating. Interment will be in the Fort Klamath cemetery.
