DEFENDANT ASKS OUTDOOR SENTENCE IN LIQUOR CASE

PORTLAND, March 22 (AP)—Outdoor-loving Joe H. Taylor, 25, asked Federal Judge James A. Fee yesterday to send him to a road camp from a stuffy cell in Multnomah county jail.

Taylor, who admitted selling liquor to an Indian at Klamath Falls, is a logger and sheep-herder unaccustomed to confinement.

The judge learned the prisoner had no previous record and referred the case to a probation officer.

Lewis E. McCutchen, also accused of selling liquor to an Indian at Klamath Falls, was sentenced to a year in a road camp and then placed on two-year probation.

James Edwin Riddle will be tried March 28 and Arthur McKenzie on April 8 on charges of selling liquor to Indians at Klamath Falls.

OLD FASHIONED MOLASSES COOKIES

1 cup New Nucoa, 2-3 cup sugar, 1 cup molasses, 1 cup sour milk, 2 1/2 cups sifted flour, 2 teaspoons soda, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1/2 teaspoon salt.

Cream New Nucoa thoroughly. Add sugar gradually and cream together until light and fluffy. Add molasses and milk. Mix well. Sift flour once, measure, add soda, ginger and salt and sift together three times. Add flour and mix thoroughly. Chill. Roll the dough out thin and cut with a floured cookie cutter. Bake on Nucoa-d cookie sheets in a moderate oven (375° F.) 8 minutes, or until done. Yields 4 dozen 2 1/2-inch cookies.

LAST MINUTE CAKES

2 tablespoons New Nucoa, 1 cup sifted flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 2 eggs, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt and sift together three times. Beat eggs until light. Add sugar gradually, beating well after each addition. Fold in flour mixture. Heat milk and New Nucoa together. Add to flour mixture. Add vanilla and mix thoroughly. Bake in well Nucoa-d pan, 8x8x2-inches in a moderate oven (350° F.) 50 minutes, or until done. Spread top with chocolate nut frosting and place under broiler until it bubbles.

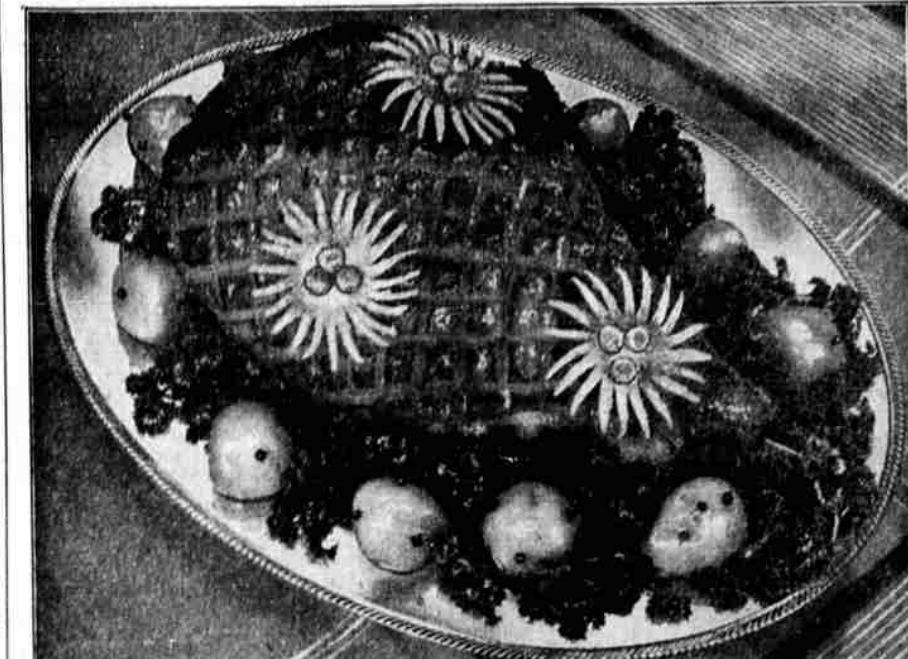

YOUTH SENTENCED IN ASSAULT CASE

Sentence of three years in the state training school at Woodburn was passed Friday morning by Circuit Judge Edward B. Ashurst, presiding over juvenile court, on a 15-year-old youth convicted on a charge of rape.

The youth, who stolidly denied ever having seen the girl involved when he took the stand in his own defense during the hearing Wednesday, was committed to the county jail, with cash bond set at \$1000.

After Circuit Judge Ashurst passed sentence, Lynn Moore, attorney for the defense, announced his intention of making a circuit court appeal of the case.

District Attorney Orth Sizemore prosecuted the case.

The girl involved is a 20-year-old domestic employed at a Klamath Falls home. She testified that the youth insisted on accompanying her home at night along the city streets, and assaulted her after they had reached the back yard of the house where she is employed.

Two Children Beaten to Death

SELMA, Ala., March 22 (AP)—The two young sons of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil E. Friday were beaten to death in their beds today, and Police Chief H. L. Dickerson said the corner found they were slain by their mother.

Dickerson said Mrs. Friday, 39, was found "in a state of confusion" by neighbors who discovered the tragedy. She was taken to a hospital.

The boys, Richard, 10, and Eugene, 14, were found in separate rooms, and the house showed no signs of a struggle. They apparently were killed with an iron bar, while asleep.
