

New Yorkers Get "Barrere Habit," Paper Reports

"These little brothers of Mozart might have been playing for archbishops and emperors instead of the large modern audience that came in automobiles. A surprising number of people have managed to get the 'Barrere habit,'" wrote the New York Sun after a concert of the Barrere Little Symphony which will be heard here on Saturday night, March 23, at the Klamath Union high school auditorium under the direction of the Klamath Cooperative Concert association.

The "Barrere habit" is by no means confined to New York and other sophisticated centers but is one common to the entire country from coast to coast. Alone in its field the Little Symphony fills a national need. When Georges Barrere founded this orchestra in 1914 it immediately caught the fancy of the music-loving public. Since then interest in orchestral concerts has increased enormously. Symphony orchestras now play to sold-out houses in all the large cities. The Barrere Little Symphony, the only travelling orchestra of its kind, brings symphonic music of the highest type to communities unable to subsidize orchestras of their own.

Composed of thirteen men and eleven different instruments, the Barrere Little Symphony possesses all the qualities of a full symphony orchestra with each member a virtuoso. It brings to life many of the long forgotten works of the great masters—Haydn, Mozart, Schubert, etc.—intimately and delicately beautiful works that had

Cooking for Two Has Its Own Problems

Cooking well for two is an appropriate subject for spring. Ordinary division doesn't always work to cut down a large recipe to fit a family of two. She soon learns that there are many special problems involved in small-quantity cooking.

Keep a record of the number of servings you can get from a certain amount of the different foods. The record might be something like this: 1 pound dried prunes yields 10 to 12 servings; 1 pound broccoli yields 2 to 3 servings; 1 quart sauerkraut yields 5 to 6 servings; 1 pound ground meat yields 5 servings.

Many times there are savings to be made through buying food in fairly large quantities. Compare the price of foods in different size containers and figure how much you can save on the larger size. Then, of course, figure on your storage and refrigeration space for the extra food.

If you buy larger quantities, plan how they are going to use them while they are still fresh. For example, the No. 3 size can of fruits is often most economical. But if you buy a large can of peaches or pineapple, you don't need to serve the same fruit every day.

BREAKFAST: Stewed pears, dry cereal, boiled eggs, wholewheat rolls, marmalade, coffee, milk.
LUNCHEON: Meat stew with vegetables, rolls, baked apples, tea, milk.
DINNER: Porterhouse steak, mashed potatoes, buttered broccoli, apricot soufflé, coffee, milk.

ECONOMY AND VARIETY
Use the peach halves as a salad with cottage cheese for lunch one day, make them into shortcake for dinner the next day, serve with toast for breakfast on another day. Use some of the pineapple from a large can in a salad, save the rest for broiling with ham and some for use later in a fruit cup.

Some foods are almost planned-to-order for two. Egg dishes, chops, cutlets, ground meats, stewed meats, sausage, bacon, sliced ham, liver, kidneys, heart and tripe are among these. If
