EASTER

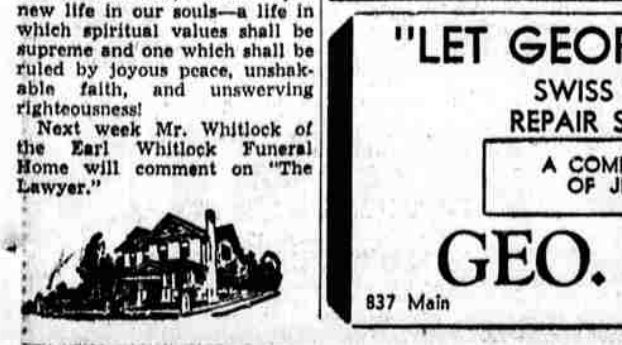

ADLER SEEKS RENOMINATION FOR CORONER

Dr. George H. Adler, county coroner, announced Saturday he will seek re-election this year. Dr. Adler will be a candidate for the democratic nomination at the May primary.

He has served two terms as coroner, being first elected in 1932 on the slogan, "The coroner should be a physician."

"I have been pleased to serve the county as coroner for the past eight years," said Dr. Adler Saturday. "If the people feel that service merits re-election, I will appreciate their support and vote at the forthcoming elections."

"The records of prompt investigation and economy, carried forward consistently through my two terms in office, speaks for itself."

SQUIRREL POISON SEASON ARRIVES

Spring-like weather of the past week has brought ground squirrels out in increasing numbers throughout all the farming districts of the county. Most land owners are agreed that the squirrel pest is not particularly heavy so far but that if squirrels are allowed to go unpoisoned until after the young are born, a healthy and plentiful crop will result. The county agent's office has prepared the usual spring supply of poisoned oats and an additional ton will be ready before the end of the week.

The following dealers have been supplied to date: J. W. Kerns, Klamath Falls; Mac's Cash store, Merrill highway; and Malin Mercantile, Malin. Other regular handlers of this material will be supplied the early part of the week, namely, the Hildebrand store, at Hildebrand; Bliss Service Station, Dalry; Beebe store, Bonanza; Irrigation District office, Langell Valley; Ben Faus, Merrill; and possibly Fort Klamath later in the season.

In addition, a constant supply is maintained at the county agent's office, Klamath Falls. Laws of Oregon provide and require that poisoned oats be prepared according to standard formula and distributed to land owners throughout the county at cost of labor and materials by the county agent's office. Usually, Klamath county farmers use four to six tons of this poison each season.

Poisoning is most effective in warm, still weather, early in the morning being the best time. Put out by placing a small quantity, generally eight to 15 grains scattered in front of each live squirrel hole. It should not be placed out in lumps or piles as this is particularly dangerous to livestock. It should not be broadcast as this is a waste of material. Occasional broadcasting on ranges is sometimes resorted to but is not too effective. Every hole in the field or pasture should be poisoned at this time and poisoning should be continued until squirrels are destroyed. Laws of Oregon require that noxious rodents of all kinds be controlled by land owners and prescribes the best methods to follow. Any method, however, that will destroy the squirrels is acceptable.

The poisoned oat bait consists of high grade oats coated with a mixture of strychnine, soda, syrup, starch and glycerine. Poisoned oats are dangerous to livestock or children and should never be left where accessible. Poisoned oats should never be stored in anything except the poison marked bags in which they are sold, as this is extremely dangerous. Every care should be used in handling this poison as well as all other poisoning materials.

Squirrels, if allowed to go unchecked, can seriously damage crops, highways, irrigation ditches, drains, and destroy considerable land value by digging holes and tunnels, as well as building mounds on the land.

Fire Destroys Home Near Malin

MALIN, March 23 (Special)—Fire early Saturday morning destroyed the Joe LaClair home a mile east of Malin. Mr. and Mrs. LaClair and their two children, ages 5 and 2, escaped through a bedroom window.

LaClair, who is principal of the Malin elementary school, said he built a fire in the living room stove when he and his wife returned from a high school party. About 3 a. m. Mrs. LaClair was awakened by smoke filling the room and aroused the family.

The Malin fire department was called but lack of water at the farm home made control of the flames impossible. The LaClairs saved only a few blankets as the four-room house and its contents burned to the ground. About \$700 insurance was carried. The family drove to Dunsmuir to the home of Mrs. LaClair's mother for temporary quarters.

tion—and an additional \$90,000,000 in loans for agricultural purposes.

May Avoid Taxes

Until the farm bill reached the senate, Mr. Roosevelt's budget estimates for various purposes had been reduced approximately \$303,000,000 in congress in an effort to avoid the \$460,000,000 of additional taxes which the president advised to finance "emergency" defense outlays.

Although the increases in the farm measure offset most of the savings voted previously, Senator Barkley of Kentucky, the democratic leader, has expressed belief that additional taxes might still be avoided. The possibility of accomplishing this by trimming defense appropriations has been suggested in some quarters.

Bodia said at first the apartment appeared vacant, but he opened a closet door and found Davis cowering on a shelf. He said Davis crawled down, submitted to arrest without protest and admitted the slaying.

"Did you kill your mother?" Bodia asked.

"Yes, I killed her," Bodia said the young man sobbed.

His wife, Mrs. June Davis, 20, broke down when she was informed of Davis' capture.

ahead were reports of a large concentration of German submarines just outside Norwegian waters and the statement of a German commander to a Norwegian fishing captain that submarines soon would be "as common as fishing boats."

British warships today discovered rafts from the Danish steamer Charkow, reported sunk, probably by torpedo, yesterday. The body of a seaman was on one raft, but there was no other trace of the 15 reported missing.

On the British credit side was the sinking of the German steamer Hedderheim near the entrance to the Baltic sea, reported yesterday as the first such action by a British submarine.

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Chicago Detective Squad Probed on Shakedown Charge

CHICAGO, March 23 (AP)—Charges that hundreds of innocent men had been arrested and falsely accused of sex offenses by four Chicago detectives operating a shakedown racket will be investigated Monday by a grand jury.

The inquiry was ordered by State's Attorney Thomas J. Courtney. The charges were filed with civil service commission by Police Capt. John Howe, who investigated the case for Police Commissioner James P. Allman.

Commissioner Allman has suspended the accused officers—William J. Kearney, Edward Hickey, Elmer Johnson and Francis O'Malley. All are attached to the police morals squad.

"Hundreds of innocent citizens were seized in Loop buildings, theaters and comfort stations both in the Loop and Park district territory in Michigan avenue and Grant park," Capt. Howe said.

"The arrests almost always followed this pattern: the person arrested is asked his business. When he arrives at the lockup he is left 'open' (held without a charge) and sent to the bureau of identification. Soon after a lawyer appears in the lockup and informs the prisoner he is in a 'bad jam' and offers to get him out for from \$200 to \$400."
