WHEAT ADVANCES TWO CENTS BUSHEL

CHICAGO, March 25 (AP)—An advance of as much as two cents a bushel today carried wheat prices to their best level since February 23 and to within less than 3 cents of the mid-December peak, which stands as the market's highest in more than two years.

Cold weather and pessimistic crop reports as well as European war news were factors behind the upturn.

LA LONDE IN SHERIFF RACE ON DEMO SIDE

R. A. (Smiley) LaLonde announced Monday that he will run for the office of sheriff of Klamath county in the May primary. His name will be placed on the democratic ballot.

The statement he issued Monday follows: "In announcing my intentions to run for the office of sheriff in Klamath county, in the coming election, I do so with a full realization in regard to the responsibilities of this office.

"I served as a police officer with the Klamath Falls police department, from February, 1931, until March, 1937, and have had the opportunity to become familiar with the duties of one holding this office.

"I am strictly opposed to that condition which prevailed so openly and without abatement in this city, and other towns about this county, up to about a year ago. I refer to the gambling and Main street racketeering, which has robbed and exploited the workmen of their earnings.

"If elected to office, this condition shall not exist during my term. My conduct in office will be a fairness to all, and a protection to the workers, mothers and children of this county against the manipulations of the gamblers and racketeers."
