

PROMINENT STAGE ACTRESS VISITS

Charming visitor in the city during the past week was Miss Kareen Allyn, prominent personality in theatrical, moving picture and radio circles in London and New York. She is the niece of W. M. Knight of this city and her trip here was the occasion of their first meeting, Miss Allyn having made her home abroad for many years.

Miss Allyn, in company with Knight and his son W. W. Knight of Portland were dinner guests one evening at the home of Judge and Mrs. E. B. Ashurst. She left for Portland after a sight seeing trip to Crater lake and parts of the Klamath Indian reservation, which interested her greatly.

Youthful and vivacious, Miss Allyn proved herself a stimulating conversationalist. So many things about Oregon and the west appealed to her and stimulated her curiosity that it was difficult to turn the subject to her own very fascinating career on the stage, which had its professional initiation on Broadway where she played the role of Hedda Gabler in Ibsen's famous play at the age of seventeen.

With her mother and her aunt, Portia Knight, both bred to the tradition of the stage, and with Ellen Terry as her god-mother, Miss Allyn laughingly remarked that fate appeared to have marked her for the theatre from the start. She received most of her education in France and England, having attended the Chateau de Grolay in Paris and ending up with the Academy of Dramatic Art in New York City.

Although she has also appeared in both screen and radio productions, her chief love is for the stage. "It's my opinion, and you can quote me on this," she said, "that nobody is in moving picture work except for the money. As compared with the stage, it's really awful."

Asked if she found any great difference between English and American audiences she replied quickly, "Every audience varies—but it is typical that Americans are quicker on the pick-up. Even before a laugh line is out of your mouth the people will be roaring their amusement. In London a slight pause is usually necessary before the line takes hold and in the provinces one actually has to wait, filling in with some bit of business, before the audience responds."

When she left, she vowed she was coming back for a longer stay when she could make a fishing and hunting trip, ride a western saddle (she is an ardent polo player) — and eat "hot dogs" to her heart's content.

TWO OREGON BANKS HAVE RESOURCES OVER \$25,000,000

Oregon has two of the commercial banks of the country with total resources of over \$25,000,000. They are the United States National Bank, Portland, ranking 58th with \$144,385,000, and the First National Bank of Portland, ranking 75th with \$122,985,000, according to the first 1940 edition of Rand McNally Bankers' directory, just off the press.

There are 275 commercial banks in the country with over \$25,000,000 in total resources—a gain of 14 banks in six months. Total resources of these 275 amount to \$43,265,359,000, a gain of \$3,092,139,000 in six months.
