

FORMER RESIDENT DIES OF INJURIES

Word of the death of Paul Emerson Laird, 27, a former resident of this city, was received in Klamath Falls the early part of the week. Mr. Laird died at Mast hospital in Myrtle Point Sunday morning following an automobile accident several hours earlier in front of the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter M. Laird, Myrtle Point.

Mr. Laird had gone to the aid of a motorist stalled in front of his home and was measuring gas in the tank when a car driven by a former schoolmate crashed into the rear of the machine crushing Mr. Laird's legs. Amputation of both limbs followed at Mast hospital, and Mr. Laird died a short time later.

Mr. Laird was born in Myrtle Point on December 2, 1913. In addition to his parents, Mr. Laird is survived by his wife, Ada Hardin Laird, formerly of this city; one son, Donald, and two sisters, Mrs. Bonnie Dutton of Wilmington, Calif., and Mrs. Elberta LaFlame of San Bernardino, and three brothers, Norman of Empire, Jesse J. of Port Orford, and Philip of Myrtle Point.

The early years of his life were spent at the family home in Brewster valley with the exception of several years in Coquille. On March 26, 1934, Mr. Laird and Ada Hardin of Klamath Falls were married here. They lived in this city until a short time ago. Mr. Laird was a brick mason by trade and worked on both the Klamath Union high school and county hospital jobs. The Lairds lived at 311 Division street.

Mr. and Mrs. O. J. Hardin, and Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Fairbanks of Klamath Falls returned here Thursday after attending funeral services for Mr. Laird on Wednesday in Myrtle Point.
