NEW SNOW FALLS AT CRATER LAKE

Four and one-half inches of new snow was reported Thursday at Crater lake, increasing the snow depth there to 118 inches and raising hopes of ski fans that conditions would be improved for the Crater Lake Ski club tournament Sunday.

The complete road report issued at the chamber of commerce Thursday is as follows: Klamath Falls to Bend: Two inches of new snow at the summit of Sun mountain. Snow depth 36 inches. Road is clear of packed snow. Snowing hard at 8 a. m.

Crater Lake: Four and one-half inches of new snow. Snow depth 118 inches. Roads are in good winter condition. Chains necessary from park headquarters to the rim. Cloudy. Visibility zero. Condition of snow: soft, dry.

All other roads are clear of snow and in good condition with the exception of the Willamette and McKenzie passes which are still closed.
