

NEW MAP SHOWS HIGHWAY CHANGES

New highway developments in the state during the past year are shown in full on a 1940 edition of the Oregon map published by the Oregon state highway commission. A supply of the maps, which are available to the public, has been received at the Klamath county chamber of commerce.

The Willamette pass highway, which is to be opened to traffic this summer, is shown as a completed stretch of paved highway stretching from Eugene to its junction with The Dalles-California highway eight miles north of Chemult. The section between Oakridge and the junction has previously not been paved, although part of it has been open to traffic.

Other newly paved sections in this part of the state include the following: The rim road around the east side of Crater lake, the stretch of highway between Dairy and Bonanza, new stretches of paving on the Lakeview-Klamath Falls highway on Quartz mountain and just west of Lakeview, completion of a section of highway between Summer lake, completion of a section of highway between Bend and Burns, east of Brothers, Ore.

There are more than 20,000 silver fox farms in Norway, with this nation producing the bulk of such pelts in Europe.

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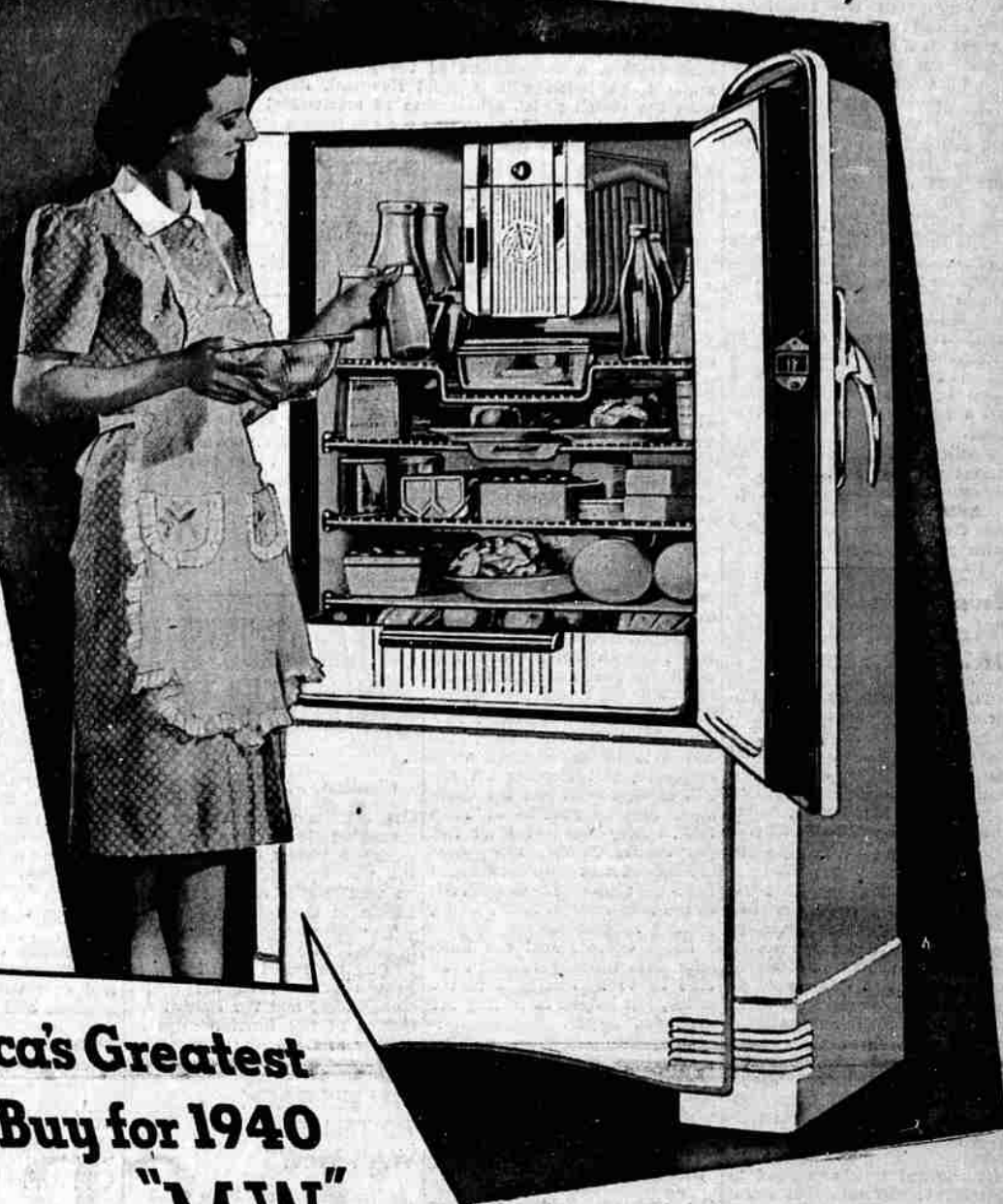
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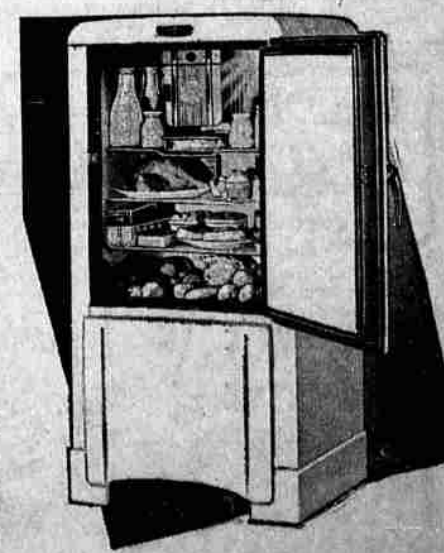
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
