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LANDRY ENTERS GOP RACE FOR LOWER HOUSE

The state legislative contest Friday drew Paul R. Landry, who declared for the republican nomination to one of the two seats in the lower house filled by Klamath county voters. His statement follows:

"I respectfully submit to the voters of Klamath county my candidacy for nomination in the May primaries for representative in the state legislature.

"I was born, educated, and reared in Louisiana, and came to Oregon in 1923. I was associated with Arthur R. Wilson until 1933. I have owned and operated my own insurance business in Klamath Falls since 1925, which business brings me in intimate contact with all classes of people, large business, small business, agricultural and laboring men. I feel that through such experience I am well qualified to pass on the problems of the people of Klamath county as a whole.

"I am married and have two girls, who are attending the Klamath Falls schools, and I am very much interested in what kind of a community these girls are being reared.

"I have served on the highway committee of the Klamath county chamber of commerce for the last several years, and I am intimately acquainted with the highway necessities of our county. If elected, I will strive to develop a secondary highway system in the state that will make possible the development of urgently necessary rural and market roads, with a definite pledge that I will endeavor to get some of the money that is being spent in the Willamette valley and Multnomah county expended in Klamath county.

Crater Lake: South and west entrance roads and road to rim are covered with new wet snow. Plows are in operation. Chains absolutely necessary. Total snow depth, 123 inches. New snow, 41 inches since March 26. Description of snow: Surface soft medium. Temperature at 8 a. m. Friday, 27 degrees. Temperature range for previous 24-hour

period: Maximum, 35 degrees; minimum, 27 degrees. Weather, snowing; moderate, southeast wind. Usual parking, warming and first aid facilities at Annie Springs checking station, park headquarters, and the rim. Overnight accommodations unreserved this weekend for 24 men and 17 women. Highway No. 62 through Fort Klamath to south boundary of park in good condition.

Diamond Lake: Highway 230 remains closed. Total snow depth, 20 inches. New snow, 10 inches since March 27. Description of snow: Surface soft medium. Temperature at 8 a. m. Friday, 26 degrees. Temperature range for previous 24-hour period: Minimum, 18 degrees; maximum, unrecorded. Weather, strong, southwest wind. Snowing hard.

Lake o' the Woods: Road from Fish lake open to ranger station at Lake o' the Woods. Chains advised. All other roads closed. Total snow depth: Varies from bare ground to 15 inches.
