

KLAMATH TOPS LIST IN STATE FOR NEW JOBS

SALEM, March 29.—Klamath Falls took the lead in Oregon's back-to-work movement last week with 200 full-time placements with private industry. Of these about half were with 20 logging and lumbering outfits resuming operations, according to the weekly report of Lee C. Stoll, state employment director.

Eugene in second place with 110 new private jobs also leaned heavily toward the lumber industry, while Portland in third place with 80 full-time jobs and 95 temporary private placements covered several dozen firms in varied lines.

For the second successive week placements outnumbered new applicants, this time by 1554 to 1162 or nearly 35 per cent. Of the total 671 were regular private jobs, 508 temporary, 192 public and 183 supplementary. Other offices showing heavy placements were Newport 113, Bend 112, McMinnville 83, Medford and Albany 64, Salem 55, and Marshfield 51.

Complete 1939 figures just received show Oregon's front position in the nation-wide re-employment campaign. Though 34th in population, this state ranked 18th last year in total placements, 16th in full-time private jobs, 14th in public placements and third in supplemental jobs. In percentage decrease in the active file only two states—West Virginia and Pennsylvania—exceeded Oregon's cut of 51 per cent, while the state's increase of 77 per cent in private placements found only 10 states with better records.

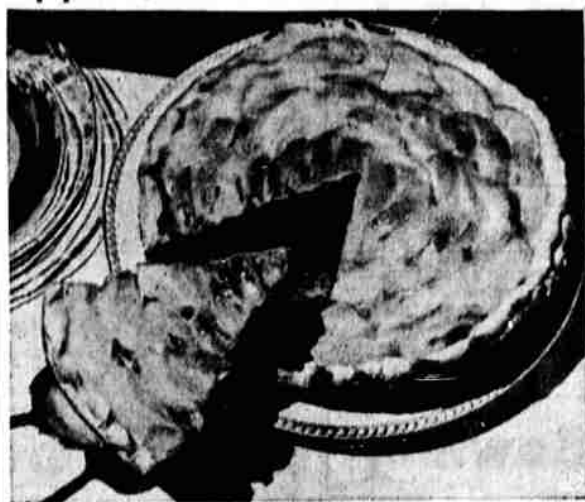

Formula for Frankfurters in Attractive, Tasty Manner

Even the most humble of meats should be dressed up for Sunday dinner. How do you like this fancy-go-to-meeting recipe for frankfurters?

Crown Roast of Frankfurters (Serves Four to Six)
One dozen small onions (uniform in size), 6 potatoes, 1 bunch of carrots, diced, 1 pound green peas, 1 pound frankfurters.
Peel potatoes, cover with cold water, add salt. Cook until soft. Drain, mash and season with salt and add a little dill.
Make a mound of mashed potatoes; stand steamed frankfurters around to form a crown, make border of carrots, peas and glazed onions.
Diced Carrots
Cut one bunch of carrots lengthwise, then slice in little cubes, add 1 cup water, a teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 teaspoon sugar, cover and cook until water is absorbed and the carrots are tender. Season with salt and pepper to taste.
Peas
Put 1 pound peas in a 3 cup boiling water, add 1 tablespoon butter, a teaspoon salt, cover and cook slowly until peas are done.
Glazed Onions
Boil onions in salted water until done, but not too soft. Drain.
Brown 2 tablespoons butter and sugar, add onions and shake around in pan until onions become nicely glazed and a little brown.

Try Fruit Dishes, Especially Apples, for Color, Freshness



Low-cost luxury . . . apple pie sweetened with honey.

Fruit in the menu is like flowers in the window. Gives life a fresher aspect.

Apples are always cheap enough for the limited fruit budget and when it comes to dessert, they will tumble over themselves to do the right thing. Try making a honey apple pie sometime. Serve it with rich milk or cream and with wedges of American cheese. Or else, serve this easy to make low-cost luxury.

Apple and Raisin Compote (Serves 4 or 5)
Four tart apples, 1 cup sugar, 1 1/2 cups water, a cup seeded raisins, 1 lemon. Pare and core apples. Cut into eighths. Combine sugar and water and cook 5 minutes. Add raisins cut in pieces and sliced lemon. Cook apple sections in this syrup until tender but still retain their shape. Remove apples to dessert cups. Cook syrup until thickened. Pour over the apples.

Magic Peach Charlotte (Serves 6 to 8)
Ripe banana, a cup strained honey, a teaspoon salt, a teaspoon grated orange or lemon rind, 1 egg white, unbeaten; 2 cups finely diced peaches, chilled.

Rub banana through fine sieve and measure 1-3 cup puree into

bowl. Add honey, salt, rind, and egg white. Beat with rotary or electric beater 6 to 8 minutes, or until stiff and creamy, and mixture has lost its spongy texture. Chill. Just before serving fold in peaches and pile on slices of sponge cake.

Rhubarb, comfortably secure in the budget list of foods, also can add spice to the low cost menu.

Spiced Rhubarb (Serves 6 to 8)
One pound rhubarb, a cup sugar, a teaspoon ground allspice, a teaspoon cinnamon, a teaspoon cloves.

Cut rhubarb into one-inch lengths. Add sugar, and cook slowly until tender. Then add
