First steps in the construction of a new home for G. Gardner on Portland street are shown in the above picture.



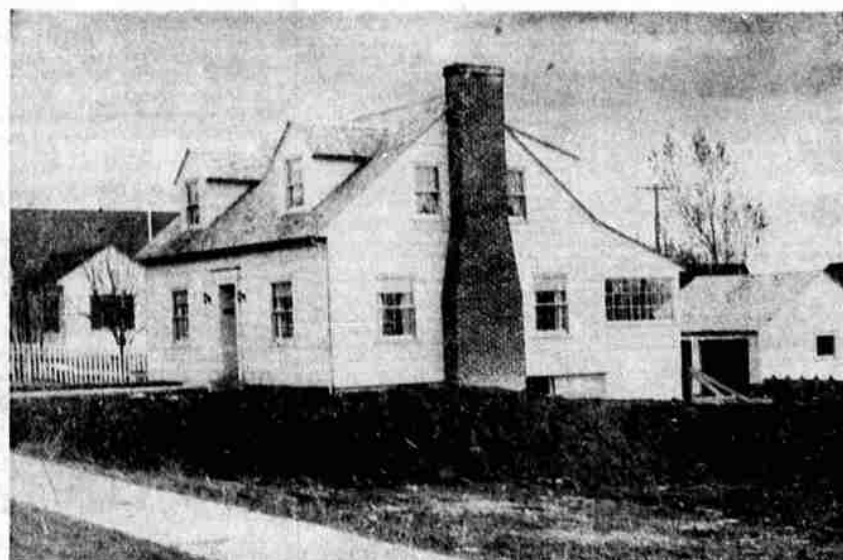
One of the larger construction projects in the vicinity is this new Bible Baptist church, nearing completion on Millers lane.



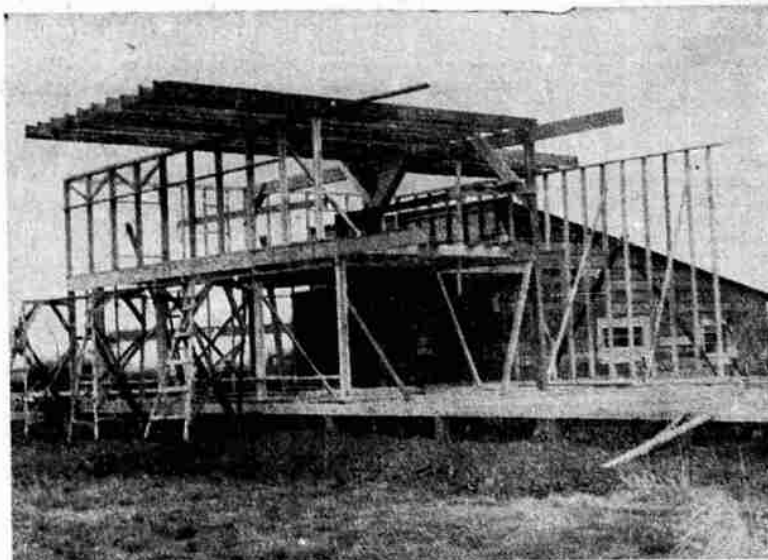
Dr. Peter H. Rozendal is building this new home at the corner of Crescent avenue and Fulton.



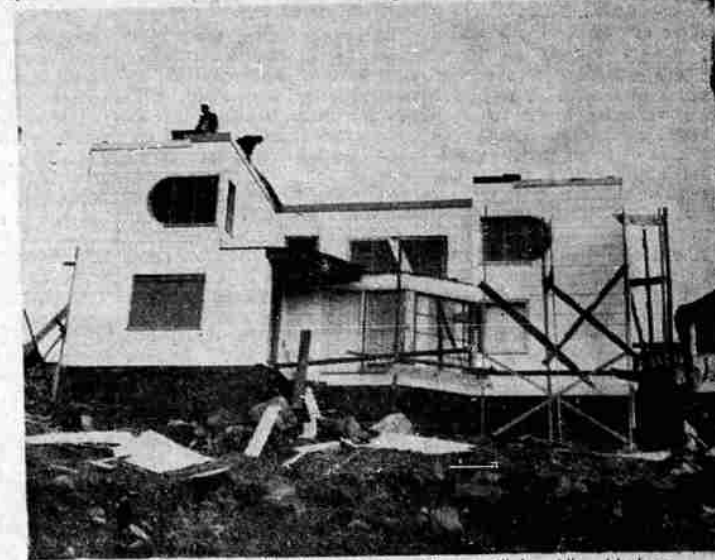
