THE LAWYER

In this wonderful America of ours, we can safely criticize, even vilify our President, our legislators—anyone in authority—with exception of the courts. When you criticize the Law, as represented by the Courts you can be jailed and punished.

Now this is as it should be. Ours is a government of Law, as created by our elected representatives. Only through that Law justly and firmly administered, can we remain free men and women. And the men who are most influential in upholding the majesty and the dignity of the Law are those who make the study of Law their life-work—the Lawyers.

Every legal action is taken because someone feels that, under the Law, he has been injured and seeks redress. Every defense is undertaken because someone feels that, under the Law, he has acted within his rights. Even those lawyers frowned on by the more solid men of the profession, who help their clients through legal trickery are, in the long run, doing us a service. Because lawbreakers, being humanly fallible, most laws are full of holes when first enacted and only through the efforts of shrewd lawyers are those holes discovered so that amendments can make them tight against evasion.

I notice that the man who hollers loudest against lawyers and who cries shrillest against their fees, is usually the man who first screams for legal help when he gets in a jam and who can well afford to pay stiff fees.

And when you look closely into this matter of fees, you will find that the Lawyer, like the Doctor—and the Funeral Director, for that matter—does a lot of charity work in the course of each year, for which he doesn't get—or expect—any credit.

POLICE SEEKING HIT-RUN DRIVER AFTER ACCIDENT

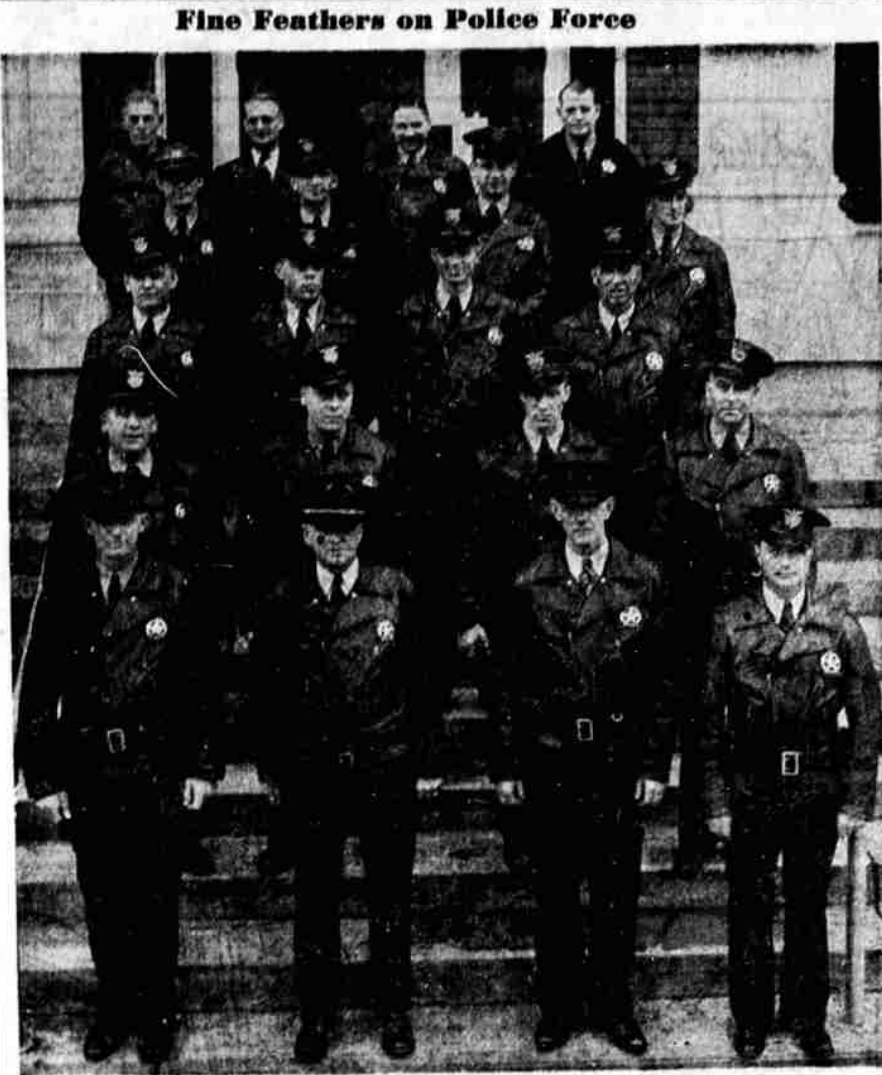

MARCH DISREGARDS TRADITIONAL EXIT

Not only did March come in like a lion, but she went out like one, with the first day of April showing a minimum temperature of 29 degrees, and a maximum of 48.

March did right well by herself, however, and came near to hanging up a few records. For example the mean maximum for the month was 54 degrees; mean minimum, 33.1 degrees; mean, 43.5 degrees or 4.1 degrees above average and warmest March since 1934; maximum, 74 degrees on March 21. Minimum temperature, 20 degrees on March 12.

Total precipitation for the month was 3.37 inches or 2.16 inches above normal. It was the wettest March since 1928, when 3.40 inches was recorded at the Klamath station of the US bureau of reclamation. Other wet March months include 1904 when 3.62 inches was chalked up, and in 1899, when 3.43 inches was the figure.

There were eight clear days during the month; 15 days which were partly cloudy, and eight cloudy days.

Other figures issued by the reclamation service included precipitation at other points in the district. At Tulalake 2.80 inches was reported for the month; Clear lake dam, 2.96 inches; Gerber dam, 4.22 inches.

Sunday's minimum temperature was 33 degrees, maximum was 40 degrees, and 41 inches of precipitation was recorded. A trace of precipitation fell early Monday morning, and records showed 15.56 inches for the stream year. Normal is 9.21 inches.
