

WATER SUPPLY GOOD IN LAKE COUNTY, CLAIM

Jack Almeter, manager of the Klamath office of the federal-state employment service, has just returned from two days spent in Lake county, and reports that water conditions there are the best he has seen in years. Draws reservoir is completely full, and all streams are running strongly, indicating that the ground is well saturated. Goose lake has more water in it, he was told, than at any time since it began to refill. The weather has been warm, and grass is starting.

SCOUTS CONFIDENT OF BIGGER CIRCUS

Plans for the annual Boy Scout circus, scheduled for next Saturday at the Klamath Falls armory, are fast rounding into shape and scout officials expect a circus bigger and better in many respects than the first event of its kind, held last year. The event which captures most of the interest of scouts as well as spectators is the wall-scaling race, in which teams of eight scouts scramble over a 10-foot wall. As many teams as wish to can enter this event.

The program will be presented twice on Saturday. Large attendances are expected for both shows. A grand entry parade will proceed down Main street before the opening performance, with all packs and troops taking part.

All troops of Modoc area with the exception of those in Fremont district are taking part. More than 500 scouts will have roles in the various events. The program will include a bike exhibition, specialty acts, "the chant of the jungle," wall-scaling, reproduction of a shipwreck, an animal parade, pioneering projects, a clown act, the evolution of signaling, and a pageant of flags.
