VOLUME ON INDIAN LAWS COMPLETED IN WASHINGTON

There has just been completed for publication, under direction of Senator Thomas of Oklahoma, chairman of the Indian Affairs committee, the fifth volume of "Indian Laws and Treaties," a work inaugurated in 1902 with volume 1 containing all Indian laws, and volume 2, inclusive of all treaties by the United States with the Indian tribes. Volume 3 was published in 1916 and volume 4 in 1927. The latest volume embraces all Indian statutes enacted by congress since 1927, together with intervening executive orders and proclamations relating to Indian reservations and tribes. Out in the Redskin country, these books carry almost biblical authority. They are cited and quoted by federal and state courts, and extensively used by committees of congress, the executive departments, libraries and others interested in Indian affairs. When volume 5 is off the press, copies will be available to senators and representatives for distribution among Indian constituents. Charles J. Kappler of the Washington bar compiled the series.
