CORVALLIS, April 5 (AP)—Albert Powers of Coquille was re-elected president of the Western Oregon Livestock association last night. E. A. McDonald of Vernonia was named vice president and H. A. Lindgren of Corvallis, secretary-treasurer.

The use of forested or logged-off land and the problem of classification were dealt with directly or indirectly in most committee reports.

The association advocated classification of publicly owned lands and the blocking of scattered public lands.

Problems relating to reforestation, land classification and fire protection will be studied by a special committee to be appointed by the president.

The state game commission was commended for preservation of wild life.
