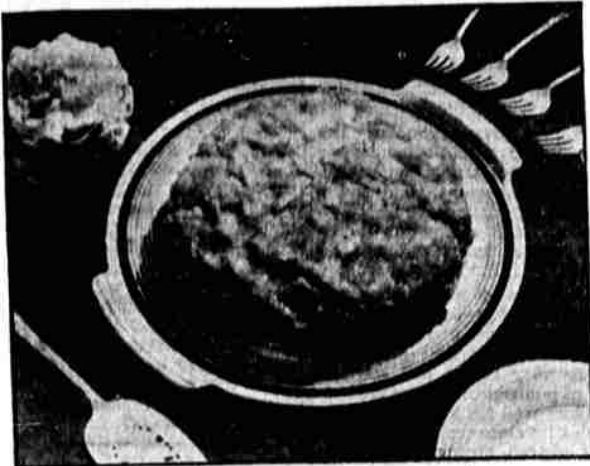


Serve a Springtime Dessert



With the first signs of spring—sunshine, robins, gay crocuses and bursting buds—pep up your meals with colorful springtime desserts. A rosy-pink rhubarb upside-down cake, topped with puffs of delicious whipped cream, is just the dessert to stimulate jaded appetites.

This simple butter cake, of delicate texture, with a rhubarb marshmallow topping has a tart-sweet taste that is a perfect ending for lunch or dinner. Serve the cake slightly warm, and for an unusual note, add bits of marshmallow to the stiffly beaten whipped cream. And the tender rhubarb the more attractive will be the cake.

Rhubarb Upside-Down Cake
Rhubarb topping:
4 cups rhubarb, cut in 1/2 inch pieces.
8 marshmallows, quartered.
1 cup sugar.
Mix the rhubarb with the marshmallows and sugar. Spread in the bottom of a buttered 10 inch iron skillet or heavy cake pan.
Cake:
1 1/2 cups cake flour
2 tsp. baking powder.
1 tsp. salt.
1 cup butter.
1 cup sugar.
2 eggs, separated
1 cup milk
1/2 tsp. vanilla.
Sift flour, measure; sift twice with baking powder and salt. Cream butter, blend in 1/2 cup of sugar and cream until light and fluffy. Add well-beaten egg yolks and beat vigorously until smooth and light. Add flour mixture alternately with the milk, beginning and ending with flour, and beating until smooth after each addition. Add vanilla. Beat egg whites until stiff and gradually beat in the remaining sugar; continue to beat until smooth and stiff. Fold lightly but thoroughly into batter. Pour into pan, over the rhubarb. Bake in a moderate oven (350 F) for 35 minutes, or until cake is done. Let cool 10 minutes before turning out of skillet onto serving plate. Serve slightly warm, with whipped cream. Serves 8.

NEW PINE ORDERS SLIGHTLY HIGHER

PORTLAND, April 5 (AP)—Reports from 111 Western Pine association mills showed last week's new business was 68,744,000 board feet of lumber compared with 68,458,000 the previous week.

Shipments totaled 68,496,000, a decline from 69,789,000, and production reached 56,993,000, a drop from 59,020,000. For the corresponding week a year ago orders were 53,981,000, shipments 55,254,000 and production 46,283,000.

To date orders are 826,794,000 feet compared with 670,760,000 for 1939.

RIGHT OR WRONG ABOUT PEOPLE

"GIVE me a man customer any time, in preference to a woman," is what any salesman will tell you. "Women want to know everything about the article before they buy it. They take longer to make up their minds. And they are much more likely to return the article if it does not work out just the way they wanted."

Now listen to what many husbands say: "Women go crazy when they are out shopping. Look at the funny hats they buy just because they are bargains and not because they need them. It's a shame the way they spend the money we earn!"

Both the salesmen and the envious husbands are probably right. Some women do go into a shopper's delirium when they see a bargain—but by and large, the average woman is better at getting her money's worth than her husband is.

From our analyses of around 22,000 newspaper readers last year, we found that more women than men read the advertisements. The women even read the advertisements of men's products sometimes better than the men themselves do.

It is obvious from these new facts that the woman is more likely to know what is new, what has the best prices and where things can be bought to best advantage. After all, she is simply tending to her business, for it has been estimated that much more than half of the money spent in stores is on purchases made by women who, in most cases, are the purchasing agents for the entire family.

Women should be better buyers than men. It is their business. They spend more time at it, getting much more practice, and have the salesman show them everything before making up their minds.

This may annoy the salesperson, but undoubtedly it makes the family budget go farther week after week in spite of the occasional unnecessary hat which was just too good a bargain to resist.

IMPORTANT: Carefully observe timing for each method. Measure 2 level tablespoons of coffee to each cup of water. Vary water slightly for exact strength desired. Keep coffee-maker clean.

PERCOLATOR: Start with cold or hot water. Percolate slowly 7 to 10 minutes after steady pumping starts.

COFFEEPOT: Bring coffee to boiling. Stir. Remove from fire. Add a little cold water and let stand 5 minutes to settle.

STRESSING: Pour boiling water on coffee. Stir well. Stir again in 5 minutes. Steep for a total of 10 to 15 minutes.

DRIP METHOD: 6 to 8 minutes preferred. If less than 2/3 capacity is made, water will drip too fast, giving weak coffee.

GLASS VACUUM-MAKER: Put upper bowl on after water boils. The coffee and water should be in contact 5 to 7 minutes.

Hint of the week: Serve coffee promptly after making. If it's necessary to let coffee stand after it is made, keep it on a warm spot on the stove where it will not boil. Cool coffee cannot be reheated without injury to flavor.
