Plan To Beautify Highways in State Discussed Friday

A meeting which interested a group of Klamath Falls women was called for two o'clock Friday afternoon in the chamber of commerce rooms when they were asked to meet with Mrs. Frank N. Smith of Portland, executive secretary of the Oregon Roadside council, Mrs. Evan Reames of Medford, chairman of the Jackson County Roadside council, and Mrs. Gene Faverick, also of Medford.

Mrs. Smith spoke during the afternoon on the general beautification of Oregon's roads and highways, emphasizing that "some \$45,000,000 were spent in Oregon during the past year by visitors, and Oregon should be able to offer them beauty along the highways on their trips through the state."

It is expected that a chairman for Klamath county will be appointed by the state council later.

The purpose of the Oregon Roadside council is to eliminate unsightly billboards, to clean up the roadsides, and especially entrances to cities in the state, mark state lines as approved by the state highway commission, and to promote roadside parks.

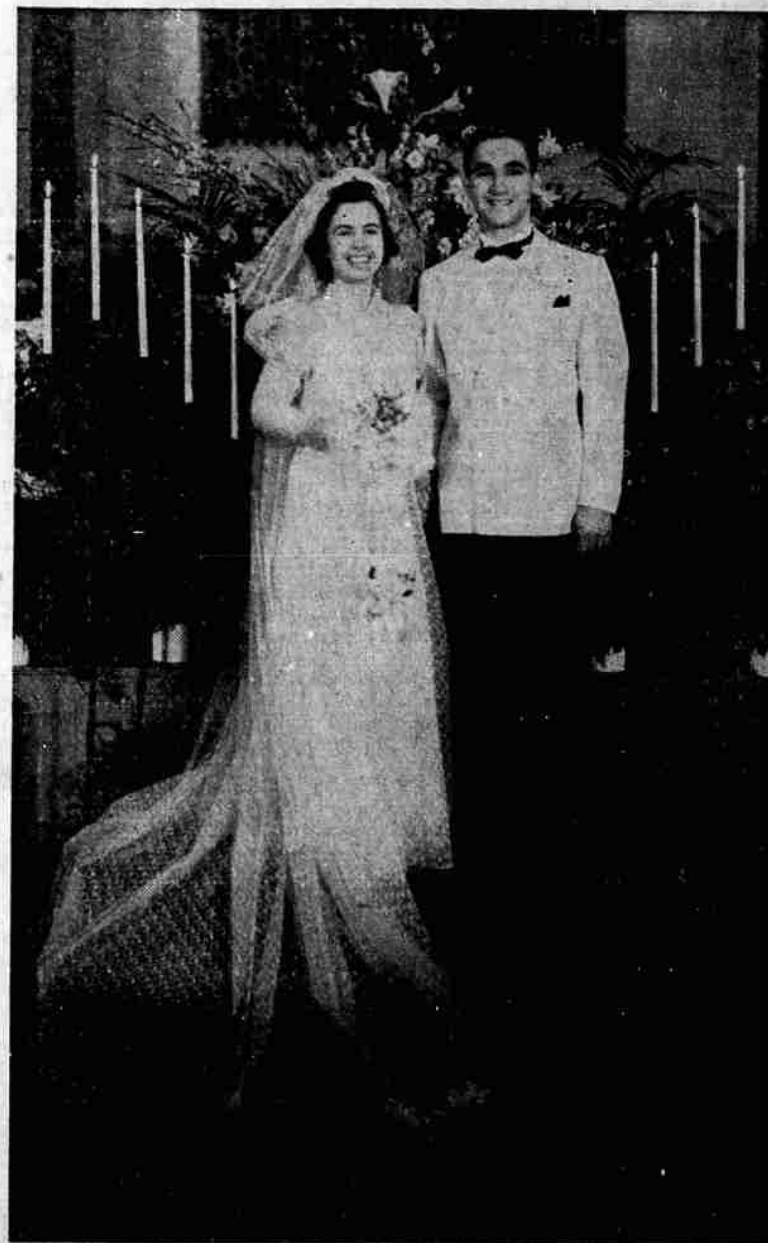
