Organized as a community male chorus, the Eugene Glee men, seventy men from the business and professional life of the University city under the direction of John Stark Evans, will bring to Klamath Falls when they sing here Wednesday, April seventeenth, at the Pelican, not only a musical event of interest and merit but also an example of true civic enterprise. The proceeds of the concert, without profit to the Glee men, will be donated to the 4-H club and FFA, projects of the Rotary club, sponsors of the concert.

For fifteen years the Glee men have sung willingly and often for various community betterments and charities throughout the state and the northwest. Benefit concerts under service club and other sponsorships have been sung many of them in series for several years in Salem, Corvallis, Roseburg, Marshfield, Coquille, McMinnville, Corvallis and Portland, where in a series of eight annual concerts the Glee men have raised over \$18,000 for the Shrine hospital for crippled children and for the Portland Rotary club child welfare fund.

"We feel fortunate in obtaining the services of the Glee men for our project here," said Mr. Glenn Hout, chairman of the committee from Rotary club in charge of concert arrangements.

Dr. Sharp Is Speaker

Members of Eulalona Chapter Hear Talk On Medicine

Dr. Paul Sharp addressed the members of Eulalona chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, at their regular meeting Monday evening, at the home of Mrs. D. V. Kuykendall.

Dr. Sharp traced the evolution of preventive measures in medicine from the magic and witchcraft of the medicine men of primitive peoples, through the asafetida and sulphur and molasses period, of a not-so-far-distant day, down to the vaccines and antitoxins so widely and effectively in use today.

The normal span of life, according to Dr. Sharp, has been extended several years by the efforts of health building agencies, and other preventive measures developed by science during the past century. Tuberculosis, cancer, diphtheria, measles, infantile paralysis and smallpox are among the diseases that are being conquered in greater or lesser degrees by new discoveries in preventive treatment. Dr. Sharp's talk was both instructive and entertaining.

Talk Given At Luncheon

Chinese Scholar Gives Talk on War Situation In His Homeland

Dr. C. S. Lee, a Chinese scholar, as guest speaker for the Scholastic club on Thursday noon at the Willard hotel, had a breathless audience as he told of the bombing of his home town by the Japanese, the destruction of his home, making him, with countless others, a homeless refugee, and of his trek to the sea shore where he was able to embark for America.

Dr. Lee, fifteen years ago an exchange scholar from China to America, took his Doctor of Philosophy degree at the University of Ling Nan, afterward studying at Columbia university. Since his return to America he has attended the UCLA and Stanford universities.

He spoke eloquently of the sympathy for the Chinese cause that he has encountered everywhere among American people, but spoke regretfully of the constant outflow of armament material from America to Japan, and of the fact that thereby America was really helping to arm a potential enemy.

Dr. Lee thought that passage of the Pittman bill would rectify a situation with which ninety per cent of the American people are dissatisfied, as the bill will eliminate further shipments to Japan of scrap iron and other necessities of warfare, and as a result the Japanese military activities would have to disintegrate within a short time.
