

League Hears Program

Government-Economic Study Group Arranges Meeting

Unusually informative and interesting was the program held before the League of Women Voters last Monday afternoon when the government and economic study group of the league presented "Relief in Our Community" under the direction of Mrs. Leo Sagehorn.

Mrs. Lena Melas opened the discussion by giving the background for the subject and statistical facts about population and industry of this community. Mrs. Altha Urquhart, director of relief for Klamath county, then spoke on "Public Assistance," stating there were approximately seven hundred people receiving aid in the county, of which number there were \$50 in Klamath Falls and that none were on the waiting list.

"Applicants are eligible on a basis of need, regardless of citizenship. To satisfy residence requirements, one must have lived in the state of Oregon three continuous, uninterupted years prior to application. The last twelve months of which should be in the county where the application is placed. Non-residents can be and are frequently provided for by our agency. There are no federal funds available for non-resident persons."

"All cases eligible for assistance are allowed medical care. The local government is obligated by law to pay not more than fifty per cent of the funds used in general assistance. The state is obligated by law to pay not less than fifty per cent. The county contribution is derived from the general property tax. Revenues from the state liquor tax supply the fund used by the state."

Following Mrs. Urquhart, Miss Manche Langley, assistant state director of the WPA, spoke on the "WPA in Klamath County." She told, in interesting detail, what the WPA is doing and how it is functioning and accomplishing its objectives.

Mrs. T. D. Case described the mobile camp at Merrill, showing how great an improvement this camp was over such camps as the one existing recently in the Tule lake district where the seasonal transient workers lived on the ditch banks in most unsanitary conditions. Mrs. Case said there were now three such camps in Oregon as the Merrill camp, and that next year it is hoped to have more. She also stated that the Merrill camp is self-governing and that it proved most satisfactory in every way. There is a nurse with a well-equipped trailer established at this migratory camp to provide medical aid.

Mrs. Case traced the plight of the migratory worker, saying that the churches started to help in this field about twenty years ago. Their first help was given transient workers in New Jersey and, though their funds were extremely meager, they managed to assist with a child health program and by forming some nursery schools. They accomplished this with the aid of college girls who volunteered their services during summer vacations. The churches are still devoting much effort toward helping the transients solve their problem.

In more recent years, as the soil erosion and dust bowl tragedies speeded up the grim needs of these people, the Farm Security Administration has stepped in and given constructive help. But this is still far from adequate, according to Mrs. Case, as shown by the fact that the entire state of California which has most of the migratory workers has only three traveling nurses with medically equipped trailers to serve the health needs of all these people.

Mrs. Case said that California started using migratory labor as long ago as 1870, using first Chinese workers, then Mexicans and now mostly transient Americans.

She thought, after an extensive study of the situation, that John Steinbeck's book, "The Grapes of Wrath," portrayed the problem accurately and was not exaggerated.
