DOUBLE CONTRACT

Klamath high's Snowy Gustafson was instrumental in the signing of two important agreements during the trip just completed to Seattle and points north.

No. 1 contract and the more permanent of the two was fulfilled March 30 at St. James Cathedral in Seattle, when Best Man Gustafson turned his coaching aptitude into the matrimonial field at the wedding of his wife's sister, the former Maizee Hepler of Seattle, to Wildcat Coach Frank Nihil. The Nihils, after a wedding trip to British Columbia, are now back in Klamath Falls, where Frank reported Monday at the beginning of the semester at Klamath high.

Parties involved in Contract No. 2 were elusive. Snowy spent considerable time at Everett, Wash., cornering Mentor Roy Sandberg of Everett high—finally locating him on a boat jaunt—and billed the Pelicans for a football game at Everett September 20.

Everett, in turn, agreed to visit Modoc field the following season under a two-year agreement.

Although Snowy was pleased at the arrangement, he is not expecting to defeat the undefeated Everett team, ranked tops of the Washington prep league. It will mark the first jaunt of the Pelicans into the northern state and falls in line with Snowy's policy of signing teams as tough as they come. He still seeks an upstate team—one from Portland would nicely fill the bill—for an open date October 4.

CHICAGO, April 8 (UP)—"Old Mr. Billiards" completed his comeback Saturday with a record of sheer perfection seldom equaled in any sport.

Willie Hoppe, of the Chesterfieldian manner and artistic touch, ran out his unprecedented, unbroken string of victories in the world three-cushion billiard tournament by defeating Cleveland's Jake Schaefer, Jr., 50 to 40 in 51 innings.

It was victory No. 20 for the Silver Fox. Along the way—27 days of nerve-racking billiards—he regained the three-cushion crown, set two new world records and earned at least \$3500 in prize money.

Nothing like it ever has been seen in the history of billiards. It goes down in sports records as a feat comparable to Jesse Owens' Olympic triple, Babe Ruth's 60 homers and Red Grange's four touchdowns against the Michigan powerhouse of 1924.

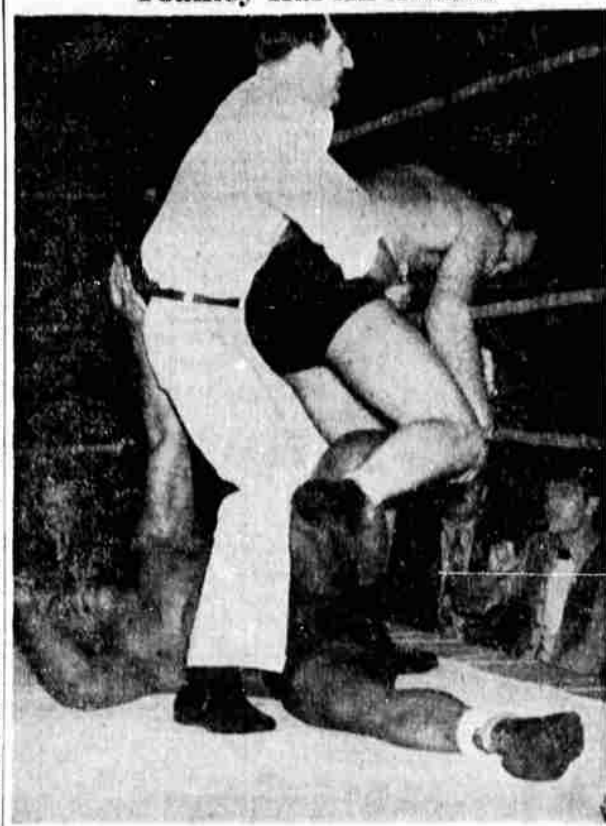

JIM DEMARET WINS MASTER GOLF MEET

AUGUSTA, Ga., April 8 (P)—Now that Jimmy Demaret is champion of the golf masters, you'd better start writing him into your book as a strong favorite—quite possibly the favorite—for the national open title which will be decided at Cleveland in June. He may be the "laughing boy" of the links, but you have to take him dead serious when the chips are on the line.

His brother professionals certainly don't underestimate him. The best illustration that comes to mind of how highly they regard him was supplied yesterday by one of the golf wives. After congratulating Jimmy on winning the masters with a 72-hole score of 280, she said:

"I hope you won't be coming to Cleveland to play in the tournament. Couldn't you just be there as a spectator?"

"Laughing Boy" is going to be very busy this summer. From here he will go back to his club in Houston, but starting in May he'll be hitting the tournament circuit for all he's worth.

Demaret's victory brought him \$1500. Lloyd Mangrum took second money of \$800, with a 284, while Open Champion Byron Nelson's 285 gave him third and \$600. Harry Cooper, Ed Dudley and Willie Goggin bracketed 287, while Craig Wood, Sam Snead and Henry Picard wound up with 288's.

Charley Yates of Atlanta had a 293 for the amateur, which put him two strokes ahead of Bud Ward, Spokane, Wash., United States amateur champion, and three up on Jim Ferrier, Australian open and amateur title holder.

NEW YORK, April 6 (UP)—The University of Michigan won the team title of the national AAU indoor swimming championship Saturday by placing second in the 300-yd. medley relay race—the event in which Adolf Kiefer of Chicago swam to a new world backstroke record.

Kiefer, swimming in the 300-meter medley relay, gave his Chicago Tower club teammates a yard and a half lead as he completed the 100-yard backstroke leg in 57.9 seconds, bettering his own world mark of 58.8. The performance did not, however, top the Kiefer's American record of 57.8. The explanation lies in the fact that Kiefer's best performance was made before the International Amateur Athletic federation accepted world marks in "yards." They formerly were scored in "meters."

Kiefer's great effort, however, was not enough to give his teammates victory in the event they had to have to nose out Michigan for team laurels. The Princeton AA trio of Al Vande Weghe, Dick Hough and Ned Parke won the medley in 2:54.6, and Michigan's team of Francis Heydt, John and Gus Sharnett came in second—a length back, a stroke ahead of the Chicago threesome.

NEW YORK, April 8 (UP)—They're putting the last coat of green paint on the stands and ten thousand or more grandmothers around the major league circuit bravely are battling to postpone their demise until 10 days hence.

Baseball's big day is April 16 and the 16 clubs are on the move north and east from Florida, Texas and California for the grand opening of the national pastime's 101st year.

Trooping through the provinces for their final exhibition games, the major leaguers are stepping up the pace to get arms, eyes and legs in shape for the getaway on the 154-game grind. Events in the southern and western training camps forecast a year of startling surprises.

Biggest surprise of all may be the end of the 4-year Yankee reign. Leaving Florida, the best looking ball club out of the 11

that trained in the grapefruit country was the Boston Red Sox.

Joe Cronin's club, the most murderous bunch of hitters in baseball, has tightened its offense and come up with the most promising pitching staff since Tom Yawkey bought the club in 1934.

The Red Sox may get help from three rookies, Outfielder Joe DiMaggio and Pitchers Herb Hash, Bill Butland and Mickey Harris, DiMaggio's speed, arm and defensive ability will help the Red Sox even if he hits only 280. Hash, Butland and Harris, the last a cocky southpaw, have all shown enough stuff to win in the majors.

The Yanks have also come up with a fine looking young right-hander, Marvin Breuer from Kansas City. Otherwise, it's the same old Yankee club.
