

ARMORY FILLED FOR BOY SCOUT CIRCUS EVENTS

An estimated 2000 spectators filled the Klamath Falls armory Saturday afternoon and again in the evening for showings of the second annual Boy Scout circus. Approximately 500 scouts took part from 20 troops and five cub packs of Modoc council.

Troop 33, Malin, won first prize in the wall scaling contest, only competitive event in the circus, with an average of 23.5 seconds. Troop 6, Klamath Falls, was second with 24.5, and troops 13 of Lakeview and 44 of Tulelake tied for third with averages of 25.

Highlight of the evening performance was the presentation of the Silver Beaver award, highest award for volunteer scouting, to R. C. Groesbeck, president of Modoc council. The presentation, in behalf of the national council on the recommendation of Modoc officials, was made by W. A. Constant, council vice president.

General chairman of the circus was C. S. Elliott. Dwight Gilchrist, Modoc area executive, extended his appreciation to the numerous committeemen who assisted.

TICKET SALES FOR SHRINE DANCE HIGH

Ticket sales were reported high by the committee in charge of the annual Shrine dance for the crippled children's hospital to be given Saturday night in the armory.

Residents of Klamath county are asked to keep in mind that although this hospital is located in Portland, many children from this district have been benefited during the past few years, and support from Klamath people is necessary to continue the fine work.

Patients to the hospital are admitted from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, western Canada and Alaska. To date there have been 2283 children admitted, and 1378 readmitted, making a total of 3663 admitted since the opening of the hospital January 15, 1924. The average length of time a patient stays in the hospital is three months, and the average cost per day is \$3.50.

In the beginning the Shriners had "plenty of funds to support the hospital," but due to the loss of thousands of members during the depression, it is now necessary for them to raise funds to help support their institution. In Klamath county the Shriners give the spring benefit dance, all funds being sent to the hospital.

Each Thursday morning, according to Leatha Humphrey, for 14 years superintendent of the hospital, a clinic is held at the hospital for examining new patients seeking admission to the institution, and treatment of patients who do not require bed care. Also for observation and treatment of children who have been discharged from the hospital. The number examined and treated each Thursday averages between 40 and 60.

J. Fred Flock is chairman of the committee planning the dance, assisted by Lyle Mills, E. M. Bubb, Ed Ostendorf, Clinton Landis, Marshall E. Corbett, Floyd Patty and Walter Wiesendanger. Clinton Landis is in charge of decorating the armory, using the Shrine temple colors, orange, yellow and green.

BRITISH SUB STOPS TROOP SHIP VOYAGE

tacked by two German submarines.

A second version was that a British submarine had torpedeed a German ship.

A number of airplanes were observed at sea and heavy explosions at sea were heard on Norway's southeast coast.

After the submarine had fired two torpedoes, fishermen said the Germans started jumping overboard into icy waters of the Skagerrak.

Second Torpedo
Many of the Germans were drowned and their bodies washed ashore at Lillesand on the southern tip of Norway.

After the first torpedo had been fired, nearby Norwegian fishing boats started to pick up survivors from the water. Then the second torpedo was sent crashing into the stricken ship, killing numerous Germans who were struggling in the sea.

A steady stream of fishing craft brought survivors and bodies to Lillesand where the injured were given hospital treatment.

Fishermen narrowly escaped death or injury from flying debris when the torpedoes exploded.

On one Norwegian vessel three Germans were killed by a piece of flying iron from the second blast after having been fished from the water following the first explosion.

NAZIS FAVORED
PORTLAND, April 8 (AP)—Right now Germany is a 55-45 favorite to win the war, H. R. Knickerbocker, European correspondent and a lecturer, said Saturday. He predicted America would be drawn in, but too late to bring an allied victory.

QUAKE
BISHOP, Calif., April 8 (AP) A sharp earthquake was felt here at 5:36 a. m. (PST) today, lasting three to four seconds. It rattled windows and dishes and awakened sleepers, but there were no reports of damage.

A supersensitive photo-electric cell, used in connection with infra-red light, soon will be tested. The device is reported to enable pilots to see through fog.

with dynamite near the Danube oil port of Giurgiu.

British official quarters, denying German reports that the Danube to prevent Germany receiving supplies over this important southeastern route, said the seized dynamite had been shipped to Rumania for use in blowing up British and French river barges, tankers and tugs in case Germany should invade the Balkans.

The reports circulated by the German news agencies in southeastern European countries stated that the explosives were to have been used to blow up the narrow channel in the Danube known as "the Iron Gate," thus blocking Germany's supplies of oil and food over the Danube route.
