ROTARIANS HEAR OF IMPROVEMENTS ON TULELAKE ROADS

TULELAKE—Dr. E. F. Auble, whose hobby is helping folks get roads that can be traveled, was the guest speaker Wednesday at the Rotary luncheon. Dr. Auble, instrumental in organization of a club here, addressed his audience on "How to Build Better Highways in Communities." He was introduced by C. C. Spears, program chairman.

Dr. Auble assisted materially in getting through the bill authorizing completion of the Hatfield-Canby highway. He stated that \$400,000 in government funds will be spent in the next three years to complete the stretch, after Modoc county, with county and federal funds, completes the mile and a half stretch southeast of Tulelake, Modoc county to pay 42 percent of the total and the government the remainder.

The speaker commended Alex C. Clements, Mayor Lou Booth and others who have worked consistently for road improvement in the basin.

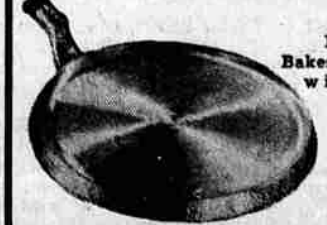
