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cruisers Bluecher and Karlsruhe and the British destroyers Hardy and Hunter.

British dispatches also said Norway's two biggest warships had been torpedoed and sunk by German vessels at Narvik with the loss of more than 500 men.

Beyond these acknowledged losses the picture of the naval warfare, apparently a series of sharp engagements raging all along Norway's fjord-marked coastline, was confused by conflicting British and German claims.

The Germans said they had scored hits on the following: four battleships, two battle cruisers, two heavy cruisers, and two transports.

British reported five German cruisers had been hit, at least one of them sunk.

The fighting, touched off by Germany's invasion of Norway yesterday, was the bitterest general naval conflict of the war thus far as waves of warplanes supported the belligerent fleets.

Germany said her land occupation of Norway was proceeding on schedule with control already established in the most important centers.

Britain's foreign secretary, Lord Halifax, announced that any Norwegian negotiations with Germany would be regarded as "action taken under duress" and would not deter Britain from fighting to drive the Germans from Norway.

His statement responded to reports from Berlin that an agreement "mutually satisfactory" to Germany and Norway probably would be reached soon as the result of negotiations.

The Iceland parliament took over control of its own foreign affairs as a result of the German occupation of Denmark, with which Iceland is united under the Danish crown. Parliament said the invasion had made King Christian X unable to exercise his powers.

Reynaud's charge that soldiers disguised as civilians were used in occupying numerous Norwegian ports might explain the speed with which Germany carried out her coup, faster than troops could have been transported from Germany to northern Norwegian ports.

A Swedish traveller returning to Stockholm from Norway last night gave another clue to Germany's swiftness, saying that at least 30 heavy bombers loaded with troops had captured the Oslo airport in a sensational manner.

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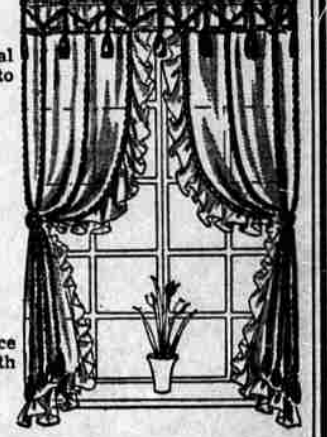
