

ART CENTER PLANS EYED BY LEADERS

The first meeting of the board of directors of the Klamath Falls Art Center association took place at the Willard hotel recently when 22 members met for lunch and discussed promotion plans for the art project in Klamath Falls.

Rev. L. K. Johnson, president of the association, gave a short introductory talk, stating that the art center association planned to have the required sum of \$1500.00 raised by July 1, and so be ready to establish the art center in the city, when congress makes the new appropriation for the national art program. In the event that congress does not continue the present art program the money will be returned to the persons giving it.

He then read a letter from J. P. Wells, superintendent of schools, a member of the art association board who was out of town, which stated:

"I am writing to give my endorsement to the art center project for Klamath Falls.

"I feel that this will be a worth while activity for those citizens who are interested in art, and will be particularly helpful to the art teachers in the public schools. From the best information I have been able to get, art centers have proven very successful in other communities, and I know of no reason why it should not be successful here."

Johnson then asked Mrs. Walter Brown, vice president to introduce the members of the board. Those present were: Mrs. E. A. Geary, second vice president; Mrs. Dwight Gilchrist, chairman of the arrangements committee; John Houston, chairman of the finance committee; C. S. Robertson, chairman of the membership committee; Mrs. C. S. Robertson, Etta Mathers, Mrs. Bertha Ezell, Mrs. J. E. Earley, Mrs. Robert Odell, Mrs. Howard Listoe, Linsy Sisemore, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Bolvin, Sam Lockwood, Mrs. E. D. Lamb, Mrs. John Kennedy, Mrs. Will Wood, Mrs. Laura Willits, Mrs. Fred Rueck and Miss Enola Hawkins.

John Houston and C. S. Robertson, speakers of the day, were next called upon. Houston stated that an art center in Klamath Falls would be a definite cultural asset to the city and urged that the program be completed rapidly. He added that Klamath Falls usually accomplished that which it set out to do.

Robertson commented on the interest which people from the outlying districts expressed in the art project. He said "Although everyone in the county will benefit from the art center, Klamath Falls must assume leadership and the desire for such a project."

Linsy Sisemore of Fort Klamath, who is also president of the Historical society, emphasized the importance of an art center for the young people of the community. He expressed a desire that the contemplated historical museum might be housed in the same

building with the Art Center and located in the central part of the city where it would be easily accessible at all times.

It was the consensus of those present that because of their close relationship, the art center project and the historical museum project should be established in the same building, thus building for convenience and permanence.

The board decided that there were two issues of importance: first that the balance of the necessary \$1500, approximately \$700 must be raised; second, that a suitable location for the art center and the historical museum must be obtained.

It was decided to appoint a housing committee, three members of which would be appointed from the Historical society and three from the Art Center association.

Denmark, Norway, Offer 250,000 Men in Armies

The combined forces of Denmark and Norway, even if at full war strength, are a mere 250,000 men against the military might of the German reich.

Dupuy's late work on the world notes that Denmark "is dominated by adjacent Germany and may easily be overrun by her neighbor. The Scandinavian nations hold the key to the Baltic sea, entrance to which only can be effected through the Skagerrak and Kattegat, except for the Kiel canal, in German territory."

Denmark's army comprises three divisions with fortress troops, with war strength of 161,000 and peace strength of 11,000. Her air force of 90 ships is considered entirely negligible. Her navy consists of two antiquated coast defense battleships, one cruiser-mine-layer, 20 torpedo boats and 12 submarines.

Norway's army, of nine brigades, a battalion of artillery and some fortress troops, has a war strength of 90,000, peace strength of 30,000 and her air force is 100 planes.

The Norwegian navy consists of four coast defense battleships, eight destroyers, nine submarines and a number of smaller craft.
