

COMPLAINTS KEEP FRANEY ON THE GO

With the coming of warm weather a great many complaints are being received by the city building inspector on everything from sanitary conditions to chickens running at large. Within the past few days 10 complaints were registered against chickens. Other complaints were made against cows, horses and goats.

The city ordinance calls for, "no manure can remain on the ground between the months of May and November unless covered with a six-inch layer of fresh earth. Where there is 10 head or less of livestock, owners must build manure boxes with fly-proof lids and flues."

Trailer houses, coming into Klamath Falls with the advent of spring, are causing quite a bit of consternation at the city hall. They are "becoming a problem from a sanitary standpoint," according to City Inspector Harold Franey.

"Trailer houses within the city limits should go to a licensed trailer camp or comply with city ordinances," Franey stated. "Trailer houses jammed or blocked up must be treated as dwellings and must follow dwelling sanitation regulations."

All trailer house locations in the city are now being inspected by the plumbing and building inspectors.

SENATOR HOLMAN BLOCKS LABOR BILL

PORTLAND, April 11 (UP)—A bill introduced by Sen. Robert Wagner of New York providing for studies of productivity of labor and of labor costs in industry was blocked by Sen. Rufus Holman, R., Ore., the Journal's Washington correspondent reported.

"I have read the bill," Holman declared, "and no more bills destructive of payrolls, as I believe this one to be, will pass with my consent."

Sen. Wagner replied that the bill had the endorsement of both employers and employees, and provided only a modest beginning.

Of the latter statement, Holman remarked, "That's what I'm afraid of."

Since the senate was considering only bills which had unanimous consent, the measure was temporarily pigeon-holed.

Precision of Germany's Occupation of Denmark Told By War Reporters

Editor's note: Associated Press staff men Wes Gallagher and Lynn Heinzerling were in Copenhagen when German forces marched in yesterday. The Germans quickly snapped Copenhagen's communications with the outside world. The following dispatch is the collaborative work of Gallagher and Heinzerling, their first sent from the Danish capital after German "protection" was imposed.

COPENHAGEN, (By way of Berlin), April 11 (AP)—Denmark awoke to her second day under German military control with so complete a show of normal life that the presence of Nazi bombing planes over the city yesterday seemed almost like a dream.

Morning papers appeared as usual, but were devoted entirely to publication of proclamations and Berlin dispatches.

It became increasingly obvious that the efficiency with which the well-planned German move was executed, coupled with quiet acceptance of the situation by the Danish public has permitted the changeover here to occur with hardly more than a stir in ordinary existence.

In an address to the Danish parliament last night Premier Thovold Stauning declared that Denmark had accepted the situation in order "to save the land and the people from the consequences of war."

He said that Denmark had agreed "under assurances that Germany has no intention in any way to disturb the country's territorial integrity and political self-sufficiency."

COPENHAGEN, (By way of Berlin), (Delayed)—With minute teutonic efficiency Germany today took control of the affairs of the entire kingdom of Denmark after a swift, relentless two-hour military coup which left the nation stunned but resigned to German rule.

By land, sea and air the reich's green-clad legions swept into the little kingdom, crushing slight opposition in Jutland and at an airport just outside Copenhagen.

A sleepy-eyed German machine-gunner—his head sticking out of a shallow hole in the lawn near the east railroad station—gave many Copenhagen east-

siders the first news of the German occupation this morning.

Danes who had gone to bed with alarming news from Oslo and the Skagerrak pouring from their radios awoke today to find German troops installed at strategic points of Copenhagen. Barricades were set up at the free port where many Germans landed. Machine-guns guarded approaches to those places.

On east side streets tired-looking German sentries stood on corners near the railway station, the routing traffic. One of the soldiers, asked how many Germans had entered Denmark, replied, "Two hundred thousand," but he smiled when he said it.

So swift was the smooth Nazi thrust that the everyday life was virtually undisturbed—for Danes, that it. Scores of British and French were trapped when the advancing Germans cut all means of communication and transportation.

American flooded into the United States consulate, seeking passports and visas.

A proclamation by King Christian and Premier Stauning declared that reich troops would "take up a connection with the Danish army" and that it is the duty of the Danish population to "refrain from every resistance" to the nazis.

Air battle was reported between British and German planes over Vestby, a suburb of Oslo.

Swedish residents of Lysekil at the eastern end of the Skagerrak below Oslo heard gunfire at 8 p. m.

German motorized troops were reported to have been driven back with 200 dead and many wounded in a battle with the Norwegian army in the region of Elversum, northeast of Oslo.

The Stockholm radio said many British and German planes were flying over the Swedish town of Stenestad, just south of Oslo at the entrance to Oslo fjord and the town was blacked out.

Norwegian refugees streamed to Sweden.

Olson Orders Removal of Prison Board

SACRAMENTO, Calif., April 11 (UP)—Gov. Culbert L. Olson yesterday ordered removal of the state board of prison directors on charges of incompetence and misconduct.

The order was not made immediately effective, however. The governor said it would be held in abeyance pending outcome of an injunction suit filed by the directors in Marin county superior court.

Olson's action followed long hearings into state prison affairs following the food riots and floggings at San Quentin prison last year.

GERMANS TOLD TO EVACUATE CAPITAL

STOCKHOLM, April 10 (UP)—British warships in Oslo fjord were reported by the Stockholm radio tonight to have served an ultimatum on the Germans, threatening to shell Oslo unless the Nazi troops abandon the city.

The British warships were reported to be in Oslo fjord opposite Oslo after forcing the Skagerrak in a naval battle with German warships.

Time Limit Set
The British commander, it was reported, was believed to have fixed a time limit for the German withdrawal from Oslo, failing which the city would be shelled.

Oslo is being evacuated, the Stockholm radio said, reporting scenes of panic in the streets and at railroad stations because of fear the British warships will open fire on the city.

Measures were taken, it was said, to evacuate women, children and old persons first.

Martin Lashed By Bridges At ILWU Conclave

NORTH BEND, Ore., April 11 (UP)—The Pacific coast convention of the International Longshoremen's & Warehousemen's union adjourned yesterday without nominating officers or selecting a convention site, necessitating another session today.

The only highlight of an otherwise dull session was President Harry R. Bridges' broadside at former Governor Charles H. Martin of Oregon, who yesterday criticized Gov. Charles A. Sprague for speaking at the ILWU convention.

Martin, in a speech at Portland, had said "Bridges and his gang of racketeers came up from San Francisco," and that he would have "seen Bridges in hell before going to North Bend to meet him."

In reply, Bridges snorted, "I would rather have seen Martin in hell than have him come here. The ILWU convention was held in North Bend this year at the invitation of the local union and the North Bend chamber of commerce. The biggest bunch of racketeers I have seen was the band at my deportation hearing—many of them hired by Martin himself."
