PLANS COMPLETED FOR SHRINE DANCE

Ticket sales to the annual dance given by the Klamath Shrine club for the crippled children's hospital in Portland continued to gratify the ticket committee as plans for the dance Saturday night, April 13, in the armory, were completed Thursday.

Archie Legg's 12 piece band with two added entertainers, is coming from Yreka, Calif., to play for the dance. Legg donating his services free in the interests of the hospital.

Here are a few facts concerning the hospital in Portland, which has aided Klamath children since its construction in 1924:

The physical therapy department, where all forms of mechanical treatments such as light, heat, electricity, corrective exercises, massage and muscle training are carried out, is one of the busiest departments in a busy hospital where 3663 children have been admitted since 1924.

The swim tank is an important part of this department, as many Klamath children know, for exercise under water, and is especially used in the treatment of infantile paralysis. This tank was donated to the hospital at a cost of \$2500.

The solarium, where all children receive artificial sunlight, was donated by the Daughters of the Nile at a cost of \$1800. It is a large unit and seven children can be treated at once. The Daughters of the Nile also do all of the hospital sewing and mending, and furnish all of the material from which the garments and other articles are made. This service they have provided since the opening of the hospital. Klamath Falls has an especially active chapter of Daughters of the Nile.

The hospital maintains its own brace shop where all braces, apparatus and shoe alterations are made under the supervision of the surgeons. The assistant brace maker is a former patient of the hospital. The Rotary club of Portland has contributed almost enough to support this department from the proceeds of their Eugene Gleemen's concerts, held each year in Portland and scheduled to appear in Klamath Falls next Wednesday under Rotary sponsorship.

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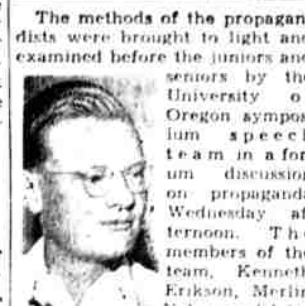
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HIGH SCHOOL

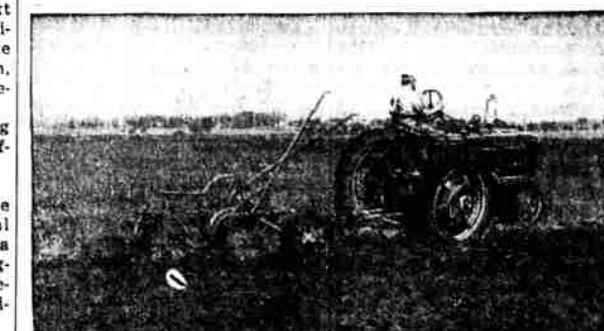
