

GROUP REPORTS FAVORABLY ON SHIP PROGRAM

WASHINGTON, April 12 (AP)—With an eye on intensification of the European war, the senate appropriations subcommittee Wednesday reported favorably a \$987,414,878 navy bill under which construction will be started on two 45,000-ton battleships, two cruisers, one aircraft carrier and eight destroyers.

As reported Thursday, the bill carried \$41,000,000 in appropriations and \$25,000,000 in contract authorizations for naval aircraft. The house approved appropriations of \$46,000,000 and \$10,000,000 for this purpose.

The senate group denied appropriations to increase the navy personnel from 145,000 to 132,000, but added \$5,039,000 requested by President Roosevelt to expand and enlarge navy yards throughout the country.

In its present form, the bill proposes expenditures in the 1941 fiscal year of approximately \$88,000,000 in excess of those in the current fiscal year. Sen. James F. Byrnes, (D-S.C.) said it will be necessary to spend \$10,000,000 for planes to stock the projected aircraft carrier Hornet, which is expected to be completed in the 1942 fiscal year.

Before the federal monopoly committee which is studying the problem of technological replacement of workers in industry came Edsel Ford, president of Ford Motor company, with condemnation for the theory of "economic scarcity" advanced by some new dealers as a national policy.

He said his company could sell a good automobile for \$500 if it could see a market for 1,000,000 of them a year, but he explained such an innovation would have a "very drastic effect" on the market.

Secretary of Navy Says President's Powers Will Safeguard U. S. Neutrality

HONOLULU, April 12 (AP)—Secretary of Navy Charles Edison yesterday said he believed powers granted to the president under the neutrality act would be sufficient to safeguard United States interests despite the German thrust into Scandinavia "unless the situation gets worse."

Commenting on the development of so-called "mosquito boats," Edison said the navy now has small attack craft which "we think" are capable of traveling great distances in rough seas.

The navy is testing a type of small craft manufactured by the Scott Payne company of England which proved very satisfactory, he said.

He indicated the mosquito fleet might be used in the Pacific ocean as part of the coast defense. Function of mosquito boats has been described as a method of launching speedy attacks against an enemy fleet.

Each would carry up to four torpedoes and meet the incoming fleet hoping to cripple it before it came within striking distance of the coast.

Edison arrived here this afternoon aboard the cruiser Indianapolis from which he has observed the progress of the naval war games in the Pacific ocean.

Asked whether he felt that in view of the new developments in the European war President Roosevelt should be granted immediate emergency powers as he requested last January, Edison said:

"I am convinced the neutrality act gives the president sufficient powers as long as con-

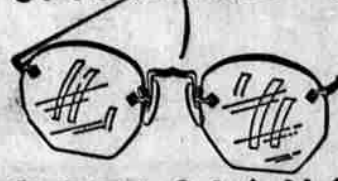
