

Club Enjoys Dinner Meeting on Thursday

Soroptimists View Interesting Oriental Collection Of Mrs. Henry Ray

Members of the Klamath Falls Soroptimist club were dinner guests Thursday evening, April the eleventh, of Mrs. Henry Ray and her sister, Mrs. Ruth Ray, at the attractive ranch home of the former near Keno. The national dish of India was served by the hostesses, assisted by Miss Betty Ray, which consisted of rice and curried chicken, surrounded by many condiments and a delicious sauce.

After a business meeting, conducted by the president, Mrs. Ida M. Odell, Mrs. Kathleen Thompson entertained with two vocal numbers and Mrs. Henry Ray then exhibited to the club trophies from the high mountainous region of the Philippines where she spent several years while Mr. Ray was engaged in developing a gold mine.

Pictures were shown of the head hunters with their instruments, shields, spears, head-axes and other paraphernalia. Beautiful garments from China, the Philippine and Malay islands, mahogany carvings from the hands of the Igorrotes, Japanese kimonos, Chinese wedding garments and other souvenirs kept the group interested for hours.

The Sixth Biennial convention of the American Federation of Soroptimist club has been announced for Salt Lake City, at the Utah hotel, beginning June the eighteenth and concluding June the twenty-first.

Soroptimist International association includes three federations—the federation of Great Britain and Ireland, that of continental Europe and the American federation, which includes Canada. The objective of the latter federation is Economic Advancement for Women, considered of utmost importance at this time. Soroptimism represents the successful business women of communities, and it is the aim of Soroptimists to lend a helping hand to those women who, through no fault of their own, have been unable to find a market for their services and talents, often as outstanding as those of others more fortunate.

Through the federation, minor objectives have been adopted by local clubs, one club building houses for widowed mothers, selling them at cost on rental payments, thus enabling mothers to keep their families together until the children reach a self-supporting age. Another club works toward placing women of middle age, left on their own resources after years of married life, in suitable positions. Other clubs help younger women to get training in secretarial, nursing and other professions and carry them through a waiting period until employment is assured. As yet, no projects of this kind has been undertaken by the Klamath Falls club, but a minor project is being carried on of helping the underprivileged child get needed dental work through the dental association.

At the beginning of April, there were 123 clubs in the American federation, twelve being in Canada. Several clubs have been chartered since this time. Over thirty have received charters since 1938, and one, that at Fairbanks, Alaska, was chartered in January by radio. The president of this club will be the principal speaker at the Portland convention April the twentieth and the twenty-first. Although not yet six months old, this club has taken as its major project the preservation of Alaskan history and historical objects.

The local Soroptimist club has actively participated in federation activities since its charter was given in June, 1938, members having attended regional conferences at Chehalis and Wenatchee, and a charter banquet at Red Bluff. One member, Mrs. Effie Garcelon, has been appointed head of an important committee for the Northwestern Region, which will report at the Portland conference on April the twentieth. Mrs. Yetta Margulis, as luncheon toastmistress on that date, will introduce Miss Miriam Dickey, president of the Alaska club.

Following the principal speaker at the luncheon will be musical selections by Miss Lois Howard, a young pianist born and reared in Portland. Formerly a student of the Columbia Conservatory of Music, she conducts a half hour radio program over KVAN at Vancouver, Washington. Miss Howard is a charter member of the Venture club in Portland, a junior group sponsored by Soroptimists.

Miss Kathryn Porter, winner of the northwest contest of Federated Music clubs last year, will be guest soloist, accompanied by Mr. Robert Hassendel.

Miss Bowerman was instantly a favorite with her charming voice and friendly stage presence. Dean Elliott showed himself the true artist in his three numbers including Chopin's, "Scherzo." Those who particularly enjoy piano were disappointed that Dean Elliott did not appear again on the program although he was a sympathetic accompanist to the others.

Barbara and Bob Harrison, sister and brother, who sing duet numbers, were both refreshing and capable, their voices delightfully sung, their voices fresh and clear. One of the favorites which they sang was "The Lord's Prayer," Malotte, which they substituted for Schubert's "Ave Maria." Their encore was, "Come Sing to Me," Thompson. Romberg's "Will you Remember," proved a great favorite. Sincere applause followed their all-too brief appearance.
