Burbank Bowler Moves Into 5th Place Tie in ABC

DETROIT, April 13 (U.P.)—Max Stein of Burbank, Calif., moved into a fifth place tie in the all-events division of the American Bowling congress Friday, exhibiting the skill that made him all-events champion in the 1937 ABC meet with an all-time high total of 2070.

The 30-year-old assistant manager of Warner Brothers Sunset Recreation rolled a 745 series in the doubles trial, while his partner, Carl Stoerkel, contributed only 520 to hold the team to 1265 for their doubles count.

Stein's performance in the trial was the second highest series of the meet, exceeded only by Max Feinberg's 755 also posted in doubles competition.

Oregon's hundreds of anglers, their ranks swollen by the arrival of many out-of-state sportsmen, Saturday morning made a mass migration to fishing streams at the 4:29 a. m. zero hour.

Prospects for a successful campaign against the trout were reported the best in several years. Streams in Multnomah, Linn, Marion, Polk and Yamhill counties, and the north half of Coos, were rated "excellent."

Reports of "fair to good" on streams in Lane, south half of Coos, Clatsop, Tillamook, Lake, Klamath, Wasco (not including Deschutes river), Hood River, Douglas, Jackson and Josephine counties were received.

Only in Benton, Douglas, Malheur, Baker, Wallowa, Grant, Harney, Wheeler, Gilliam, Morrow, Crook and Deschutes counties were conditions listed as "poor."

Trout fishing experts said bait and spinner angling probably would prove most productive, although many fishermen were expected to rely on the dry fly technique.
