## SHAW'S TARGET OF CHARGE TO NLRB

Joe Boyd and M. T. Pavolka, representatives of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union No. 2544, (AF of L) stated Saturday they had filed charges under section 10 (G) of the national labor relations act against the Shaw Lumber company of Tionesta.

They said the charges, sent to the San Francisco offices of the labor board, allege that the management has interfered with the organization of the union in the plant at Tionesta and that the company has refused to consider any proposals advanced by the union or to make alternative suggestions.

The union representatives said meetings were held beginning March 9 between local men on the negotiation committee and the management together with Attorney R. C. Groesbeck. After exhausting other means, they asserted, they filed a complaint.

The usual procedure is for a representative of the board to make a survey and investigation. If the differences are not adjusted and union claims are found to be valid, a labor board hearing follows. Such a hearing in this case would probably be held at Alturas.

# NAZIS ATTACK SEA BLOCKADE ALONG COAST

wegan port of Stavanger today, a British announcement said. The announcement said it was believed that extensive damage was done to a hangar and one aircraft.

It added that the rear gunner of one British plane, although wounded, shot down an enemy fighter plane in flames. A communique said:

"During this morning aircraft of the coastal command reconnoitered the aerodrome at Stavanger. Salvoes of heavy bombs were dropped and it is believed that extensive damage was done to a hangar and an aircraft on which mechanics were seen working.

"One of our aircraft was repeatedly attacked by a twin-engine enemy fighter, which fired several bursts at very close range. The rear gunner of the British aircraft, although wounded, continued to fire until the enemy fighter went down in flames."

**LONDON, April 13 (AP)**—Britain today acknowledged the loss of 11 bombing planes in attempts to dislodge German troops from Norwegian ports and destroy German naval vessels in the war-torn northern waters.

British fliers succeeded, the British said, in blowing up a munitions warehouse at the German-held port of Bergen, machine-gunning a destroyer and a motor torpedo boat, bombing German transport and supply ships, and shooting down four German Messerschmitt fighters. Two more of these Nazi planes were believed to have been destroyed and others damaged, the air ministry added.

The activities of Britain's powerful navy, where actions are necessarily bigger and slower, were clothed, for the moment, in secrecy. Official announcements dealt only with actions of the air force yesterday.

## SUBURBS TO GET MAIL DELIVERY

Residents of the outlying districts of Klamath Falls were advised at a meeting of the Suburban league Friday night in the Altamont elementary school, of the possibility of house-to-house mail delivery in the near future.

It is understood that a post-office inspector has been going through the section checking on roads, and those improved to the point where travel is assured the year around, will have house-to-house mail service. Boxes will be placed in front of each house for this purpose.

Representatives of the various districts are meeting Monday night to work on the suburban map and cooperating with the county court in renaming some of the roads which have identifying names. The working out of a house number system is also under way.

direct her exports almost wholly to the reich.

Sources close to the government, however, said that any such demands would be rejected firmly.

An apparent indication of the serious view which the government takes of the general situation was an urgent meeting which Premier Gheorghe Tataru held last night with the Rumanian general staff.

Reports have been current here that Germany has warned Balkan trade circles that any commercial favors accorded the allies at the expense of the reich would be regarded as "unneutral" and might have serious consequences.

The list of commodities on which Germany is imposing an embargo was submitted to Rumanian officials by Dr. Karl Clodius, the Nazis' ace economic trouble shooter and head of a trade commission now in Bucharest.

"The same crowd is perfecting plans to do in Mexico the same thing they did in Spain," the chairman added.

Their strategy, he continued, was to seek victory in Mexico's national election next July and, that failing, to resort to force.

"I know," Dies said, "that German agents and communists agents are active in Mexico now. I think we'll be able to develop this fully."

Pending hearings on this subject before his committee, which was in recess today, Dies called on the justice department to "be prepared to deter any attempts to recruit for this Mexican campaign."

Anthony Demalo of Hartford, Conn., a former officer in the Lincoln brigade, refused at the committee's hearing yesterday to tell anything about the passport he used.
