

FORCES TAKE OVER NARVIK, OTHER POINTS

transport was set afire at Bergen. A British naval squadron, led by the battleship Warspite, on Saturday sank seven German destroyers at Narvik, northern Norwegian ore port.

While official information was lacking on the number of men and the points where the British expeditionary force landed, Norwegian sources said the British occupied Narvik in the far north.

Other points considered among the most likely landing places are Namsos, about 100 miles north of German-held Trondheim and Andalsnes, about 100 miles south of Trondheim.

The quickened tempo of the war in the north was related in terse communiques from the war office, the admiralty and the air ministry.

The British said that one pilot of the coastal command flight, which was said to have returned "without damage," reported a sudden red glow at Stavanger apparently caused by a big explosion, perhaps of one of Germany's hastily-built gasoline dumps.

Germany's novel maneuver in transporting large numbers of troops by planes is causing little alarm to the British, it was said in London.

BERLIN, April 15 (AP)—German officials asserted today that no British troops had landed anywhere at Norwegian points occupied by German forces, either at Narvik or anywhere else where Germany has established herself, but may have effected landing elsewhere.

Their statement was made in comment on the British announcement that British forces had landed at several points in Norway.

It was admitted that the British may be somewhere along Norway's jagged coast of nearly 1000 miles. The coast abounds in little hideouts, but these are strategically unimportant, the Germans said.

TWO INJURED IN ACCIDENT ON HIGHWAY

Two persons are in Hillside hospital suffering from serious injuries received late Sunday night when a tire of their car blew out on the approach to the Jenny creek bridge near Pinehurst, sending the car off the highway where it landed upside down.

The injured are Mrs. Henry Gentry, 16, and Wallace Triplett, 17, both of Burton lane near this city. Mrs. Gentry suffered a fractured hip and pelvis, and Triplett also has a fractured pelvis.

Henry Gentry, driver of the car, suffered minor bruises and scratches. He was at work Monday at the Ewauna Box company where he is employed as a lumber piler.

The Hillside hospital ambulance was sent to Pinehurst shortly before midnight to bring the injured pair to town. It is understood that the three had been in the valley visiting, and were returning home at the time of the accident.

Escaped Convicts Captured Near Penitentiary

TACOMA, Wash., April 15 (AP)—Near exhaustion from lack of food and rest, Joseph Paul Cretzer, 28, and Arnold Thomas Kyle, 29, known as "the nation's No. 1 bank-robbing team," were captured last night only two and a half miles from McNeil Island Federal penitentiary. The pair escaped Thursday.

Their capture was made without resistance by a posse of 12 prison guards after a searching party of three had discovered them hiding in a bushy area near the island schoolhouse. The fugitives accidentally made their presence known when one made a noise as he shifted his position in the bushes.

They escaped from the penitentiary by driving a delivery truck, which had been left in the prison yard, through the rear inspection gate under the gunfire from a guard. The truck was found abandoned two miles from the prison.

Both were serving 25-year sentences for robbing the bank of America in Los Angeles in 1938.

GERMANY CLAIMS VICTORY AT OSLO

Haakon has declared Norway's will to fight.

Still, however, Germany does not consider herself at war with Norway although authorized sources pointed out that Germans were seizing Norwegian men-of-war and arms wherever they were found. Germany still considers herself Norway's protector against British invasion.

Since resistance is being offered, however, Germany, "to avert the possibility of great bloodshed" must — so it is argued here — nip this resistance in the bud.

VOTE REGISTRATION TO CLOSE TUESDAY

Japan Concerned Over East Indies

TOKYO, April 15 (AP)—Foreign Minister Arita summoned Netherlands Ambassador J. C. Pabst to the foreign office today to explain to him Japan's deep concern over the possible effects of the European war on the Netherlands East Indies.

Arita asked that the ambassador transmit this view to the Netherlands government. Observers interpreted today's conference as further evidence of the seriousness with which the Japanese regard the situation.
