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the railway leading to the Swedish border, about 20 miles away at that point.

The same sources said that Norwegian troops were maneuvering to surround the Germans.

The Norwegian high command's announcement of the recapture of Narvik was accompanied by a government broadcast expressing confidence that with the aid of Britain and France "we shall win back Norway for the Norwegian people."

German Demands
At the same time, the Norwegian government published a resume of Germany's original demands for complete submission, which it said were received only after Nazi armed forces had actually begun to invade Norway.

The principal demands listed were:

1. . . Issuance of a proclamation ordering the Norwegian army and the public not to resist.
2. . . All military buildings and coastal fortresses to be delivered intact to Germany.
3. . . All communications to be maintained at Germany's disposition.
4. . . Export of war materials from Norway to be halted.
5. . . All radio stations to be turned over to Germany and the press instructed to carry only information approved by German authorities.
6. . . Suspension of all maritime commerce and commercial air service, with the understanding that shipping to German and neutral Baltic ports might be resumed later.
7. . . Delivery to Germany of charts showing the location of all Norwegian mine fields.

Sweden continued to take strict precautionary measures to guard against surprises, warning the public by posters against spreading rumors or believing unconfirmed reports.

Reports reaching here from Sweden's west coast said two unidentified German cargo boats had struck mines off Marstrand, at the narrowest point in the Kattegat, and suffered serious damage.

Sears, Roebuck Employees Gain in Profit Sharing Plan

Employees of the Klamath Falls store of Sears, Roebuck and company got together recently in what was a kind of local "annual stockholders meeting." There they learned that they will share in the \$3,013,433 contribution which the company is making out of 1939 profits to the "Savings and Profit Sharing Pension Fund of Sears, Roebuck and Company Employees."

Company contributions to the profit sharing accounts of all employee members were made according to the length of their periods of service as follows:

For members of the fund who have been with the firm for less than five years, the company contributed 49 cents for every dollar deposited by the employee during the last fiscal year. For those who have served from five to ten years, the contribution was 98 cents for every dollar saved by the employee. For those with more than ten years of service, the company added \$1.47 for every dollar of the fund member's deposits.

In addition, the company contributed 20 cents for every dollar (up to \$91.00) deposited by each member, without regard to the members' length of service.

The fund operates in the following manner: Five per cent of the salary of every member is deducted at the

end of each payroll period and placed to his credit in the fund. However, all profit sharing fund members are limited to a maximum contribution of \$250 a year, thereby limiting the contribution of the higher salaried employees. The company's contributions, out of profits, are made at the end of the fiscal year. The monies thus deposited in the fund are invested in Sears, Roebuck and company stock which is apportioned among members according to the year's deposits registered to their account.

The fund now has 40,174 members. More than 98 per cent of all eligible employees belong. Its current assets amount to \$51,134,640—based on a value of \$80 per share for Sears stock—and these assets are credited directly to the accounts of the Sears employees who are members of the fund. However, the actual money deposited by the employees in order to acquire these credits was only \$12,941,945.

Manager T. R. Thompson told employees about the profit sharing figures at an employees celebration dinner last Wednesday night and presided at the meeting and passed out in sealed envelopes, individual statements to local profit sharing participants. He delivered what was in effect an "annual report to stockholders."

Mrs. Nelson said there has been a noticeable movement of the urban population from the city precincts to the close-in rural (suburban) sections.

The high command reported that German bombers yesterday had sunk a British cruiser off the Norwegian coast and also had destroyed a British amphibious warplane.

DNB, official German news agency, reported "desultory fire" by British destroyers yesterday at Narvik—implying that Germans still hold the arctic sea port.

In the German view, Narvik is only of secondary importance, anyway. Any British forces in that region have been decoyed away from the more strategic ports of Bergen, Trondheim and Stavanger, Nazi sources say.

The union, he said, has made the following demands by registered letter to company officials:

1. That all old men who worked last year be given jobs, if they want them, on a seniority basis.
2. That two men discharged last week be reinstated.
3. That the principles of seniority be recognized.
4. That company officials meet with a union committee to negotiate matters having to do with union members at the camp.
5. That the company permit the men to use a meeting place at the camp.

OREGON CITIES TO PARTICIPATE IN ROSE FESTIVAL

More Oregon cities will participate in this year's Rose Festival parade, top event of Portland's big celebration, June 5 to 8, than in any previous year according to present commitments, declared Ted R. Gamble, president of the Rose Festival association.

Definite plans for sponsoring floats advertising their respective communities are under way in several cities not previously represented, Gamble said.

Included in the Oregon list already entered are Forest Grove, Salem which recently won the sweepstakes, Park Rose, Multnomah, last year's President's Cup winner, and plans are under way at The Dalles, Oregon City, Astoria, Bend and Pendleton.

Washington cities that will participate include Ilwaco, Camas, Washougal, Vancouver, Seattle and Walla Walla with tentative plans under way in a number of other cities.

The parade which will be held on Friday, June 7, will have more big Portland floats entered than previously, according to Jack Converse, parade chairman. Interest in the parade is further advanced than at a comparable date in any previous year, according to Converse.

SHOWDOWN LOOMS IN NORWAY; WAR MAY SPREAD SOUTH

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ing the allies into the area south of the towering mountains, for Narvik has no direct communications by land with southern Norway.

It is, however, the terminus of the railroad running to the famous Swedish iron mines which precipitated the battle of Norway, because of their vital importance to the Germans. Possession of this railway will also be of high importance to the allies for movement of troops and supplies into Sweden in event that country is invaded by the nazis.

The British have a considerable way to go to get their troops into the southern area. However, they are proceeding with the methodical thoroughness for which they are famous.

Expeditionary troops are moving across the North sea in a steady stream, but because they would be merely useless sacrifices without their supporting equipment and rations, they are accompanied by supply ships. Once they are ashore they will be set for business in the dogged British way.

No Setbacks
Meantime heavy air operations continue. The allies have been paying particular attention to Stavanger, and the meaning of this is that it has a big airport which is the only efficient Norwegian base for large scale naz attacks on England. Moreover, Stavanger is the terminus of the German transport planes which are rushing troops and supplies north.

There is no indication that the Anglo-French brotherhood has encountered any setback in their highly successful operations.

Spread Forecast
Continued allied success in the battle of Norway to my mind can mean nothing else than that as Adolf Hitler sees his great gamble sinking into a terribly costly defeat he will lash out in other directions in an effort to offset his losses.

At any moment the Scandinavian conflict may start running across Europe like a prairie fire.
