

Rainiers Win 7-5 Over Los Angeles

STARS DROP 9-8 CONTEST TO PADRES; BEAVERS LOSE

The Rainiers treated the home-town fans in Seattle to a 7-5 victory over the Angels of Los Angeles as the Pacific Coast league season got underway in the Puget sound metropolis Wednesday afternoon.

Hal Turpin went the distance for the winners although he had an uneasy time of it in the seventh when the Angels clubbed his offerings for four runs. A homer by Edward Cihocki in the second accounted for the other Los Angeles tally.

Lefty Prim, who started for Los Angeles was treated to a three-run barrage in the opening inning but lasted until the sixth when the Rainiers grabbed four more counters and Jesse Flores was called into the fray. Kearse led the Rainier attack in the sixth with a homer. Lee Stine went into the game in the seventh and finished for Los Angeles.

Hollywood put on a three-run ninth inning rally that fell just short and San Diego maintained its second place in the league with a 9 to 4 victory. The Stars held a 5 to 4 lead going into the eighth when the Padres got the range of Rugger Ardizioia and pushed over five runs before Johnny Bittner could retire the side. Dick Newsome, the starting Padre hurler, was hit hard. Jim Morris relieved him in the eighth, but was himself forced to give way to Pat Tobin when the Stars began their rally. Hollywood got 18 hits to San Diego's 10.

Oakland continued in first place with a 9 to 3 victory over the hapless Sacramento Solons. Seven runs in the eighth inning, with Bill Schmidt, Warren Lilly and Warren Sandell taking a terrific shelling, brought the A's from behind. Milo Candini turned the Solons back with six hits.

San Francisco staved off a late Portland rally to win their second game in a row—and their longest winning streak this season—from the Beavers by an 11 to 9 score. The Seals got off to an early start, finding Ad Liska's submarine delivery to their liking and held a 9 to 2 lead by the end of the fourth inning. Bill Lefebvre weakened in the seventh when the Beavers scored two runs, and shoved three more across in the eighth. But when Portland scored another pair in the ninth, Win Ballou was rushed from the bull-pen to subdue the rally. Oscar Miller replaced Liska in the second, and outside of two bad innings—the fourth and sixth—pitched tight ball.

SOFTBALLERS MEET, ELECT ROYCROFT AS LOOP LEADER

Lynn Roycroft was elected president of the Klamath Falls Softball association Wednesday night at a meeting at which plans were formulated for the 1940 softball season. Estin Kiger was named secretary-treasurer.

Sixty managers and softball players were present. It was decided that the directors will contact each member team of the league and will report back at the next meeting.

Spec Murray, city recreation director, announced that this season the league will be formed of 16 teams, instead of the 12 franchised teams of last year.

The season is scheduled to get underway June 3 and will finish about August 3. District play-offs will be finished before August 14, and state playoffs are scheduled August 19-24.

The Softball association will raise funds for the installation of a new sprinkling system, lights and a fence at Rotary park, Director Murray said. The park, turned back to the city recreation department for management, will be used for all home games this season.

An expenditure of \$2000 is to be made this season by Rotary club, the funds being used for moving a house from the premises, and payment of taxes.

RIGGS ENTERS QUARTERS OF TENNIS PLAY

HOUSTON, Tex., April 18 (U.P.)—National Tennis Champion Bobby Riggs stroked his way into the quarter-finals of the tenth annual tournament at the River Oaks Country club Wednesday after being forced to 32 games by Edward (Lefty) Brown of Waco, Tex.

Riggs apparently extended himself only when the chips were down to win 10-8, 8-6, and entered the quarter-finals with five other seeded netmen and two who were overlooked in the tournament rankings. Today, the champion meets Tom Kelley, the 22-year-old Portland, Ore., youth who knocked him out in the quarter-finals of the western indoor tournament at Chicago last week and who went on to win the crown.

Unranked himself, Kelley defeated Owen Anderson of Houston, former west coast player, in straight sets, 6-4, 6-2. Bill Umstead of Baton Rouge, La., provided the only upset of the day. He survived three sets to win from Charles Harris of West Palm Beach Fla., 4-6, 6-1, 6-2.
