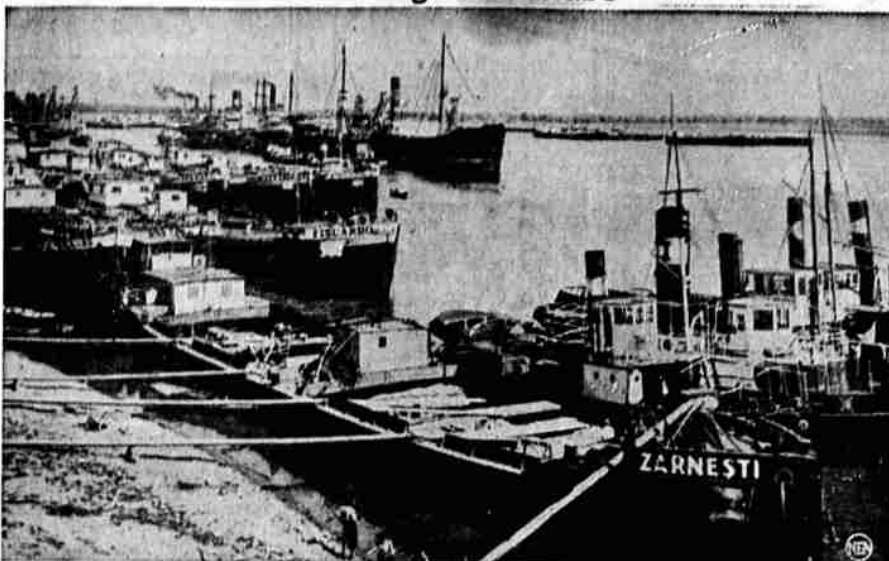

NEW TELEVISION SLATED FOR N. Y.

NEW YORK, April 19 (AP)—By the end of the summer the New York area expects to have its third television station, but functioning on a system somewhat different from the two now in existence.

License has been granted by the federal communications commission to the Dumont Laboratories to operate a 1000-watt transmitter which it plans to have ready around September 1. The station would use a flexible system of transmission with images ranging from 200 to 800-line definition in comparison to the 441-line definition of the NBC transmitter now operating and of the CBS station which still is in process of preliminary testing. Schenectady and Los Angeles stations also use 441 lines.
