Optimists in Error

A PRELIMINARY estimate on the population of Eugene has been given by the census supervisor there. The official figure for the Lane county seat will be somewhere between 22,000 and 23,000.

Eugene boosters had overestimated. Some had placed the anticipated total as high as 26,000.

Eugene has had a good, substantial growth, coming up from 18,901 in 1930. But Eugene, like Klamath Falls, has also had a great growth in the surrounding area outside the city limits, and it is probable that the optimists there had a tendency, in their estimates, to overlook the actual city lines.

Similar situations are likely to exist in many Oregon cities, Klamath Falls included. Suburban development has been extensive in many communities, but the official census figures for a city do not include the persons living just outside the limits. This technicality is going to go hard on a lot of amateur estimating on the populations of these cities.

Election Law Provisions

IN response to a number of inquiries concerning certain provisions of the corrupt practices act of the state of Oregon, quotation is here given from section 36-2424 of that act:

No person shall demand, solicit, ask or invite any payment or contribution for any religious, political, charitable or other cause or organization supposed to be primarily or principally for the public good, from a person who seeks to be or has been nominated or elected to any office; and no such candidate or elected person shall make any such payment or contribution if it shall be demanded or asked during the time he is a candidate for nomination or election to or an incumbent of any office . . .

No person shall demand, solicit, ask or invite any candidate to subscribe to the support of any club or organization, to buy tickets to any entertainment or ball, or to subscribe for or pay for space in any book, program, periodical or other publication; if any candidate shall make any such payment or contribution with apparent hope or intent to influence the result of the election, he shall be guilty of a corrupt practice; but this section does not apply to the soliciting of any business advertisement for insertion in a periodical in which such candidate was regularly advertising prior to his candidacy nor to any ordinary business advertising nor to his regular payment to any organization, religious, charitable or otherwise to which he may have been a member, or to which he may have been a contributor, for more than six months before his candidacy nor to ordinary contributions at church services.

Section 36-2426 provides as follows:
 Any person or candidate who shall either by himself or by any other person, either before or after an election, or while such person or candidate is seeking a nomination or election, directly or indirectly, give or provide, or pay, wholly or in part, the expenses of giving or providing any meat or drink or other entertainment or provision, clothing, liquors, cigars or tobacco, to or for any person for the purpose of or with the intent or hope to influence that person or any person to give or refrain from giving his vote at such election to or for any candidate or political party ticket, or measure before the people, or on account of such person or any person having voted or refrained from voting for any candidate or the candidates of any political party or organization or measure before the people, or being about to vote or refrain from voting at such election, shall be guilty of treating. Every elector who accepts or takes any such meat, drink, entertainment, provision, clothing, liquors, cigars or tobacco, shall also be guilty of treating; and such acceptance shall be a ground of challenge to his vote and of rejecting his vote on a contest.

These provisions may not be generally known, and even some candidates may not be fully informed about them. They are on the books however, and infringements by some candidates, however innocently made, are unfair to others who attempt to keep strictly within the law. Solicitation of candidates, particularly for purchase of tickets, etc., is quite commonplace, although it is specifically forbidden in the corrupt practices statute.

NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, April 19 —

Some outlying precincts of the new deal are beginning to bristle with the war spirit, but don't get your gun down yet. These unofficial salivators hinting at or prophesying United States participation may prove to be of more interest to Mussolini than to anyone else. At least a lot of top ranking American diplomats, noticing the diversion of Duce is promoting for Hitler through the Italian press, have been thinking it would be an excellent thing if the United States could do the same thing for the allies. The only trouble is the open war sentiment in a democracy carries inescapable conviction if not commitments. People are apt to believe it, whereas in Italy the press galley slaves row forward or backward as directed.

Consequently any bristling planned here will be kept as far as possible from the White House official quarters.

BALKAN JUMP

The way Mussolini has been whipping up his press organs lately has led the world to believe Duce is getting ready to jump Il Duce is getting ready to jump someplace. As the dictators have a recognized preference of picking on the weakest nations as objects of their aggression, there is a feeling here in high quarters that if he picks any he may pick Yugoslavia.

This suspicion is bolstered by inner reports that he has been encouraging the Croats there against the Serbs and Slovenes in their agitation for autonomy. It could be Greece, but the Greeks are apt to put up a struggle and are nowhere near as weak internally as the Slavs. Further, Yugoslavia offers Italy an opportunity to drive a wedge against Russian aggression from the other side of the Balkans in Roumania.

GOP TUSSELE

SCRAP—A heavy convention tussle for the republican nomination was foreseen by most of the party sages who foregathered for the arrangements committee meeting in Philadelphia. In the privacy of their executive meeting more than a majority seemed agreed there will be a lot of balloting. Their opinion dovetails fully with that of the party authorities here in both the house and senate.

This means Mr. Dewey is not going to run away with the show. It is also particularly good news to the dark horses.

FREEZING

PREPAREDNESS—Administration is all ready to freeze Swedish, Dutch, and Belgian investments in the United States as soon as the nazis cross these borders.

Through mistake when the refrigeration orders were being prepared for Danish and Norwegian funds by the treasury, an order for Sweden was also written out. It was not issued. Officials then decided to prepare others on a hold-for-release basis.

Postmaster General Farley stopped an earlier more formidable movement toward LaGuardia with a public announcement that no one except a democrat could be considered for the nomination.

ALL ABOUT BABIES

A great deal has been accomplished in reducing the number of deaths of babies under one year of age, but this has been done largely after the first perilous month of life. Deaths in the first month still remain unduly high.

If we are to make further progress in the reduction of infant mortality we must attack the causes which lie back of the earlier deaths. This is largely a matter of good prenatal and obstetric care.

The leading cause of death in the first year is prematurity. Premature infants are considered those whose birth weight is five pounds or less.

These babies require special care on account of the following deficiencies:

They have weak digestive systems and cannot take the normal feedings of full-term babies.

They are very susceptible to changes in temperature, especially to exposure of cold.

They are particularly susceptible to infections and having little resistance, often succumb.

They are liable to have trouble with their breathing.

The general bodily weakness of prematures may turn the tide so that special measures must be employed to save them. Fortunately we have at our disposal means to overcome a number of the unfavorable conditions.

In the first place we must protect them from cold immediately after birth and keep them at an even temperature by thorough wrappings with suitable blankets and pillows. If an incubator is available, the baby

should be placed in it at once and watched carefully day and night. It is not necessary to have a complicated incubator. Many premature babies have been saved in simply constructed ones.

Skilled medical and nursing care are most essential. Nurses trained in the details of caring for prematures should be employed.

How can we tell that prematures are doing nicely?

When they take their feedings well without vomiting.

When they sleep between feedings.

When body temperature taken by rectum remains between 98 and 99 degrees Fahrenheit.

When they have no difficulty in breathing nor show any blueness of face or body.

When they gain steadily, but not necessarily rapidly after the proper routine has been established.

The question is often asked, "Can premature babies grow up normally and become well and strong as full-term babies?" The answer is, "Yes," if these babies have no serious developmental defects and are taken care of by the most approved modern techniques.
