G. N. EARNS ONE PER CENT IN 1939

The Great Northern Railway company last year earned a net income equivalent to approximately one per cent on its investments in the railroads, affiliated companies and other holdings, according to its annual report made public today. Its principal outside interests are a half interest in the Spokane, Portland and Seattle railway and an approximate half interest in the Burlington system.

F. J. G.avin, president, announced earlier this year that the company's 1939 net income of \$8,686,425 for 1939 would be applied to the reduction of a \$28,132,364 bond issue which matures July 1 next. The remaining \$20,000,000 will be refinanced.

The report shows a net decrease of \$4,621,273 in the company's funded and unfunded debt during the past year.

With a gain of about 12 1/2 millions in operating revenues last year, the Great Northern expended \$4,780,953 more on the maintenance of its property and met an increase of \$1,757,235 in taxes.

The average revenue received by the railroad for hauling a ton of freight one mile dropped from .975 cents in 1938 to .918 cents in 1939.

CLERK ACCEPTING ABSENTEE BALLOTS

County Clerk Mae K. Short said Thursday that the clerk's office is now accepting absentee ballots for voting in the May 17 primary election.

Marked ballots from absentee voters must be returned to the clerk's office three days before the election.

Such ballots are used for persons who are ill and unable to go to the polls, and for persons not in their home precincts on election day.

Mrs. Short said that election boards this year are to be provided with mimeographed instructions. Holding of a school for election board members has proved impractical, she said, but the written instruction method should prove satisfactory if the sheets are given careful study.

There will be day and night boards in all large precincts, the night boards going on duty at 1 p. m. to start the count.

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Pendleton Senator Declares His Candidacy for Congress



State Senator

State Senator Rex Ellis of Umatilla, Morrow and Union counties has announced his candidacy for the republican nomination for representative from the second congressional district of Oregon.

Senator Ellis is serving his second term in the state senate, being first elected in 1937 and again in 1939.

His program was topped with the statement that "when the farmers and lumbermen prosper, eastern Oregon prospers."

He stated he favored amending the national labor act so an employer would have as much protection as an employee, and so that fairness instead of prejudice would prevail, and declared he would do his utmost to deport Harry Bridges "and his like" out of the country.

He declared himself for the continuation of the Dies' committee work.

Senator Ellis favors amending the tax laws so that business would be justified in expanding; would demand that in a longshoreman or water front strike the farmer and lumberman who pay the bills would have a seat at the table with the longshoremen and ship owners.

"Labor unions are necessary in order to maintain peace, character and stability," the senator said. "The American Federation of Labor is not radical enough to suit Madame Perkins, so she is for the C. I. O.; I am for the A. F. of L."

The importance of a prosperous agriculture was stressed in his announcement. "In 1937 when farmers produced a good year for their produce, we had very little unemployment and relief."

"As Christ symbolized the noblest and highest conception of spiritual perfection, so does Stalin or communism represent the lowest form of materialism," said Ellis.

"To Stalin or communism, man at his best is merely an intelligent animal of no more importance than the beast of the field."

"To Christ, man was the noblest handiwork of God. This country has gone a long way in Christianity and the Holy Bible. I pledge you that if elected I will never forsake this Holy Book."

Regarding the national labor relation act, which I would hope to amend. This board has put business and the American Federation of Labor in a straight jacket.

"At all hearings it acts like a bunch of sadists toward legitimate business and certain labor unions. This deplorable condition should be corrected."

ELECTION YEAR GOOD FOR FARMERS

Election year promises to be a good year from an agricultural standpoint in Oregon, according to Leslie M. Scott, Portland candidate for republican nomination for the office of state treasurer.

Scott has just returned from a swing through seven counties in eastern Oregon and reports he found conditions and hopes for the coming season encouragingly high in all sections.

"Malheur county is filling fast with new and eager farmers," says Scott. "Census figures from that area should show a substantial increase. The Owyhee irrigation and Black Canyon projects have proved a decided aid. I found agricultural prospects bright with an abundance of water in all irrigation districts. Especially notable was the boom being enjoyed in Wal-lawa county."
