

MODEL PLANE CONTEST SET THIS SUNDAY

The Altamont Junior High School Model club will sponsor a model airplane contest Sunday on the junior high school field for all boys 18 years old or less, with prizes offered in each of four divisions.

The divisions include:
Flying scale models, planes built to exact scale from real planes except for propeller and wheels. These planes must be able to fly at least 10 seconds to qualify.

Flying stick models, planes with a stick or narrow built-up body for a fuselage. These planes must be able to fly 15 seconds.
Flying fuselage models, planes not patterned after any particular plane but with a larger body than the flying stick models. These planes must also fly 15 seconds.

Non-flying workmanship models, planes to be judged on workmanship and detail of construction.

The flying planes must be powered by rubber-band motors and all lifting surfaces and fuselage must be built by the contestant. Contestants have registered their planes by name and wing-span in each division. The contest is directed by Francis Savage, industrial arts instructor of Altamont.

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Now You Can Stand Head And Lips Above the Crowd

If you want to stand out dramatically above the crowd which, by now, is completely turned out in scarlet lipstick and rouge, wear the new, very dark, black-tulip red lipstick and rouge.

Inspired by dark makeup for television, the new oxblood red makeup is especially smart with gray, white and black. It isn't natural looking, of course, but if you think of lipstick as an accessory, you'll wear the new color to point up a specific costume and not to try to make your lips look naturally bright.

Trend in Makeup Looks Dark

There is, as a matter of fact, a definite trend toward darker makeup. A new nail lacquer, with harmonizing lipstick, is the color of oxblood cherries. A new foundation film which gives the complexion a luminous glow and creates an "un-made-up" effect comes in marvelous dark shades, as well as natural ones. They will be perfect on suntanned skins, of course, but they are extremely attractive over white, winter-bleached skins right now.

The tulip-black red lipsticks and rouge are teamed up with a darker, but more golden eye shadow, darker powder to match a darker foundation lotion. The maker does not even suggest that you discard your bright red lipstick or the powder which matches exactly your natural skin tones, but simply that you have a set of darker makeup for

special occasions, because it is so new.

Beware of White Line

Remember that foundation film and powder, which are many shades darker than your natural skin tones, must be applied exceptionally carefully to eliminate all possibility of streaks and blurred areas. You must allow a little more to blend dark foundation smoothly, to get just enough at the hairline all around your face. Nothing looks worse than an artificially darkened face, entirely surrounded by a fine white line.
