Mrs. Daniel Heffner of Portland To Visit Here Two Days as Guest of Garden Club

Of interest to all garden and flower lovers are the series of talks to be given Monday and Tuesday of the coming week by Mrs. Daniel Heffner of Portland at the city library. Mrs. Heffner is an experienced horticulturist and manager and judge of flower shows, the Portland Rose show in particular, and is flower chairman of the Federated Garden clubs of Oregon.

Coming to Klamath Falls for a two-day visit, Mrs. Heffner is brought here through the efforts of the garden group of the Woman's Library club. Mrs. Heffner will speak on horticultural specimens and the principles of flower arranging.

These talks are open to the general public and will be given morning and afternoon on both days. Anyone desiring to attend the meetings may bring a paper sack lunch. Coffee to be served.

A charge of 25 cents will be made for either one or two talks on each day, and anyone wishing may attend single talks or both on the same day for that price.
