Speaks at Club Meet

Medford Resident Describes Tour of Western European Cities

Taking her audience on a "plane trip" to some of western Europe's outstanding cities, Miss Delie Whisenant of Medford gave an informal talk at the Soroptimist club luncheon Thursday noon at the Willard hotel and gave some of the personal impressions she gained during a European tour.

"Rural England certainly is not a disappointment to the imagination," Miss Whisenant said as she started her tour, describing the picturesque fields in which trees have been left standing, and the low, thatched-roof cottages. In London, she took the audience through Westminster Abbey, visiting the grave of the Unknown Soldier which she said must never be decorated with artificial flowers, and to view the royal jewels, kept in the round-shaped tower room under heavy guard.

"Rome," stated the speaker, "is said to be the city that interests the most people, while Venus is a city with a charm all its own where the only mode of travel is by gondola and Naples is an example of the most modern and sanitary city, planned and perfected by Mussolini."

Miss Whisenant termed Paris "the woman's town" with its gorgeous merchandise displays, perfume shops and perfect gardens but said that there are very few department stores and in what few there are the clerks couldn't be classed as good salespeople.

Versailles has been restored by John D. Rockefeller to almost its exact appearance at the time of King Louis the fourteenth, she stated, and in closing her talk she told of attending the Passion play at Oberammergau and of the charming manner in which tourists are entertained by the townspeople.

Miss Whisenant is a sister-in-law of Mrs. Rita Whisenant, member of the club, and is principal of the Medford Junior high school.
