

TOWNS AFLAME AS GERMANY'S PLANES STRIKE

(Continued from Page One)

planes, the Stockholm government protested strongly to Berlin today and asked measures against repetition.

Extraordinary air defenses were taken and one Swedish newspaper accused the Germans of reconnoitering Sweden's defenses.

One German plane was shot down on Swedish soil and warning shots were fired at others. The crews of two planes which made forced landings on Gotland, Swedish island in the Baltic, burned their craft.

Twice over the weekend British fliers raided the Aalborg terminus of Germany's air ferry for troops sent to Norway, only 100 air miles across the Skagerrak.

Germany said that neither raid resulted in any serious damage. On the other side of the ledger the nazis reported they had sunk two enemy submarines and two enemy merchant ships over the weekend, damaged a British destroyer with bombs, shot down four British planes and bombed allied landing operations at Namsos and Andalsnes. Swedish sources reported allied forces thrusting south from Namsos had struck at the Germans near Verdalsora, 35 miles north of Trondheim, in an effort to gain control of the railway to the Swedish frontier. Verdalsora was said to be in flames.

In the Hamar-Elverum district, about 60 miles north of Oslo, an allied column, after travelling by rail 160 miles from the coast, joined Norwegians in driving back the Germans. The Norwegian legion in Stockholm said Hamar had been recaptured and there were unconfirmed reports Elverum also had been retaken.

Minnesota Car Collision Kills Eleven Persons

SLAYTON, Minn., April 22 (AP)—Minnesota's worst traffic accident in its history which brought mangled death to 11 young men and women near here early yesterday morning, sent county and city officials on a searching investigation today in an effort to determine the cause of the tragedy which left the highway a shambles.

Two light sedans were involved in the crash—a terrific head-on collision.

Only two of 13 passengers in the two machines, ranging in age from 17 to 23 years, escaped death, and one was so badly hurt that physicians expect he will die.

The dead: Wayne Gamble, 17, Irene Schwab, 17, Rachel Fisher, 17, Harold and Lorena Tuymans, brothers, and Everett Johnson, 17. All were riding in one car.

In the second machine were George Larson, 20, Carl A. Falk, 21, Gordon Meyers, 23, Leo Egge, 18, and Hollis Luf, 21. Also in the same machine were Cecil Jensen, 19, who received a broken arm and severe shock.

So terrific was the impact, described by nearby residents as like "a cannon shot," that one of the bodies was hurled 60 feet from the wreckage. Seven of the victims apparently were killed almost outright and the others died in a hospital.

DEMO SPEAKERS EYE FOREIGN POLICY

Senator Schwelmbach (D-Wash.) told a West Virginia rally that the New Yorkers' speeches "indicate a sublime ignorance of any of the fundamentals of foreign policy."

Then, as if to indicate that there had been some coordination of democratic speeches on foreign policy, Postmaster General Farley told a Boston audience last night that the record of the Roosevelt administration in keeping the nation out of war was a "remarkably outstanding" one.

Highway engineers estimated damage to roads in southern Ohio at \$1,000,000. The drownings were reported in West Virginia and swollen streams in northern Ohio claimed the lives of two children.

Cincinnati college and public schools here were closed. The crest was expected to reach Huntington, W. Va., some 100 miles downstream, tonight but observers said the river probably wouldn't go more than five feet above the 50-foot flood stage there.

Cincinnati looked for a 50 foot crest while Louisville, Ky., prepared for a top of 36 feet about Thursday. Cincinnati's flood stage is 52 feet.

One of the hardest hit towns was Point Pleasant, W. Va., traditional flood victim. Seven feet of water swirled through the main street last night.

It is believed the total registration for the county will go over the 21,000 mark. In 1938, general election time, there were 19,710 voters registered in this county.

Deschutes county registration figures as of the close of business April 16, the deadline day, show 3869 republicans, up 130 over 1938, and 5363 democrats, up 678. That gives Deschutes a total of 9332 registrants.

Deschutes figures are of particular interest here because it is in the senatorial district with Klamath and three other counties.

Jefferson county, also in this senatorial district, has 482 republicans, a loss of 68, and 629 democrats, a gain of 36.

The bureau also voted to sponsor the Southern Pacific band, already arranged for the four-day Buckaroo Days event by the celebration committee. Members of the group will raise \$750 required to bring the 54-piece band here. It was said that, besides performing at the fairgrounds during the rodeos, the band will take part in parades through the business district and in other ways make the four-day engagement a full-time job.

Considerable discussion took place at the meeting concerning what cooperation merchants can extend the Buckaroo Days committee, and it was agreed to help stimulate an atmosphere of celebration throughout the downtown area.

newest national park, King's Canyon in California. Mr. Roosevelt plans to keep a promise to take in the San Francisco exposition, dedicate Olympic national park in Washington, and perhaps go to Juneau, Alaska, by boat.

The tour, the chief executive said, depends on conditions in Europe and adjournment of congress around the first week in June. The republican convention begins in Philadelphia on June 24.

While Mr. Roosevelt described the tour as entirely non-political, it was recalled that in 1936 he took a trip to Arkansas and Texas while the republican convention was in progress in Cleveland and made a series of speeches that shared newspaper front pages with the convention. Politicians noted that this year the president expects to go again into Texas, the home state of Vice President Garner, who is seeking the democratic presidential nomination regardless of whether Mr. Roosevelt goes after a third term.

GEORGE FREEMAN TAKEN BY DEATH

George Francis Freeman, father of Lila F. Angus and Maxine Quimowski of Klamath Falls, died here April 10 of a sudden stroke. Three other children also survive, Georgia Rutter and Edward Freeman of Los Angeles and Dorothy Smith of Phoenix, Ariz.

A prefatory declaration said the legation "has no information which would lead it to believe that the war will be extended to southern Europe."
