

Powell to Head New Battery of National Guard

Klamath's new national guard unit, Battery C of the 249th coast artillery, was mustered into service Monday night and promptly selected Lieutenant George Dewey Powell as its commanding officer on a unanimous ballot.

Old Battery D, now designated as Battery A, was on hand at the ceremony for the mustering. Battery A is commanded by Captain T. D. Case. Together, the two companies number 126 men.

Public officials, civic organization officers, and others participated in the speaking program which followed the mustering-in of the new company. Colonel Clifton M. Irwin, commanding officer of the 249th regiment, made the principal talk, and Major Kenneth Rowntree of the regular army mustered the unit into the national guard of the United States.

Colonel Irwin told of the remarkable rating made by the 249th regiment, and paid full tribute to Battery D for its part in that accomplishment. He said that he does not believe there is a national guard battery in the United States with a better record.

Total Aerial Warfare May Result From Nazi, Allied Invasions of Scandinavia

With the vanguards of the allied expeditionary forces to Norway already striking at the German invaders in the vital sectors of Oslo and Trondheim, the northern front which the nazis have been so anxious to forestall is being opened up full tilt to grow as a menace to their right wing on their own home soil.

This development may be expected to result in heavy intensification of the war in the air.

The allied navies being in control of the sea communications, Herr Hitler will have to depend mainly on his air fleet not only for supplies for his invading army but for reinforcements.

By the same token he will have to rely largely on his air to fight off further allied landings and supply ships.

Thus the battle of Norway probably is developing into an unique engagement. And the outcome will give us a fair opportunity to judge the trend of the war as a whole.

As I have remarked in this column before, the Germans are likely to stand or fall on the prowess of their air force since their surface navy has been rendered virtually impotent for major operations, and their great land fighting machine is prevented — barring a miracle — from striking a decisive blow because of the strength of the Maginot line.

The land forces will be employed. They may be let loose at any moment against Holland, for instance, but the purpose of such an attack would be mainly to provide air bases from which to strike at England and allied ships. In other words we may see a complete reversal of normal procedure and have a great army acting in support of the air force instead of being supported by it.

Apparently the Germans have depended largely on their transport planes to rush their undoubtedly substantial expeditionary force to Norway, and they also have been moving not only food supplies but light artillery and other equipment by air. This course accounts for the heavy Anglo-French attacks by

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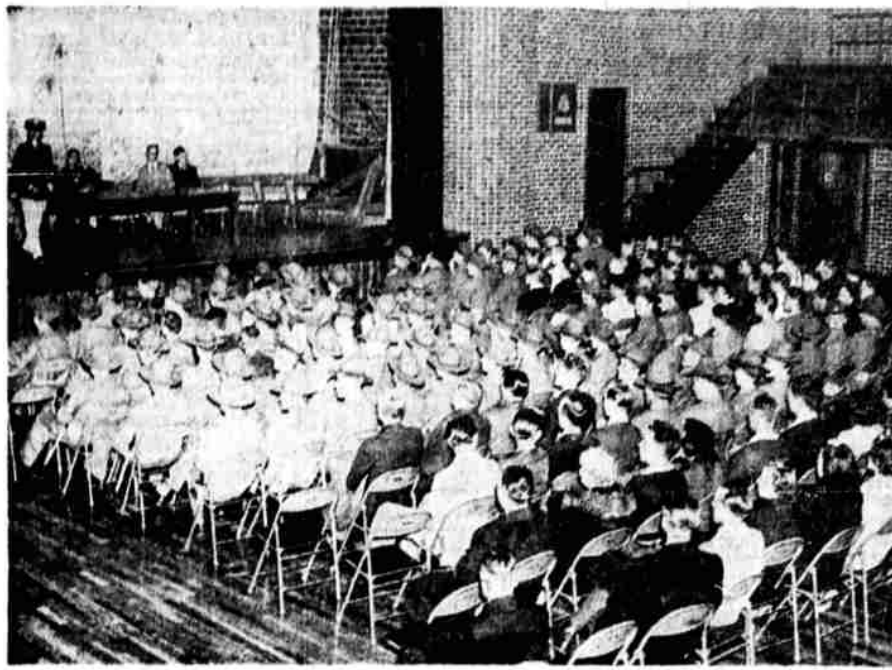

air against German airdromes and planes.

It must be said that should the Germans succeed in their venture and be able to oust the allied expeditionary forces from Norway, it would represent a very considerable victory since the opening up of that northern theatre of war was the last thing Berlin wanted.

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Johnson, Ickes Debate 3rd Term

CHICAGO, April 23 (AP)—General Hugh Johnson believes that the Roosevelt administration has created "minority rule by a radical bloc," but Secretary of the Interior Ickes contends that it "has saved us from disaster."

They expressed those views in a debate last night in Chicago's Civic opera house on "Shall the New Deal Have a Third Term?"

"Let's not let the new deal minority bloc party continue in office if we want to continue our constitutional system of government," advised Columnist Johnson, who formerly was NRA administrator.

Secretary Ickes, who lauded President Roosevelt's aims and accomplishments, declared: "The Roosevelt administration took over a broken down economic system and rebuilt it. The people of the United States are satisfied with the result."
