

CHAMBER TO BACK PILOT CLASS HERE

The Klamath county chamber of commerce directors voted Wednesday for sponsorship of the chamber of a training program for reserve pilots at the Klamath airport under the civil aeronautics authority.

A letter from Wiley R. Wright of the CAA explained the program. If the plan goes through here, approximately 20 pilots will be trained at the local port. William Randall of the Klamath Air Service appeared at the chamber luncheon in connection with the project.

Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock informed the chamber by letter that August 1 is the approximate date for the opening of the final link of the new Willamette highway. Klamath and Eugene chamber delegations will meet at Crescent Lake April 28 to discuss plans for promoting travel over the new trans-mountain route.

President E. A. Geary announced the appointment of a special committee to cooperate with local national guard batteries in connection with relationships between guardsmen and their employers. On the committee are Fred Heilbrunner, Howard Boyd, Adjutant Norman Bowyer, A. D. Collier, Frank Holmes and Oscar Moeller.

A letter was received from the Lake county chamber of commerce setting April 29 as the date for the annual get-together of Lake and Klamath county chamber directors. The event will be at Lakeview.

An invitation from the Jackson county chamber of commerce to attend its annual meeting Thursday evening was read at the luncheon.

Klamath Falls faces one of the heaviest spring building programs in its history with as much construction under way within the city limits as without, according to a check with books kept by City Building Inspector Harold Franey.

Two figures were withheld for a time but permission given to start work, Franey stated. One was for a lumber yard which George McCollum will erect on South Sixth street and East Main, with one temporary building, 20 by 30 feet, a second of 100 by 80 by 60 feet. The buildings will be constructed specifically on lots 11, 12, 13, block 205, Second Mills addition. Figures will be available within a short time, Franey stated.

DANCERS DIE AS MOSS IN HALL FLAMES

Hebert said after the blaze died down he got other negroes to help him remove the dead but soon discovered they were rifling the pockets of the corpses. Even as late as daylight, he said, he caught one sneak thief leaving with a cornet.

The deputy said Bandleader Walter Barnes was among the dead and that only two members of his 12-piece orchestra escaped.

Formed Oven
"The building is entirely sheathed with corrugated iron," the deputy said, "and this formed an oven in which the dancers were baked. The only exit was an ordinary-sized door at the front. The windows had been boarded up to keep out 'gatecrashers'."

"All indications are that the fire started near the door and spread quickly in the moss, which had been hanging for several years. A ventilating fan in the rear may have sucked the fire upon the helpless dancers who huddled near the bandstand in the rear.

"When I got there moans were heard under the mass of flesh and we dug among the bodies to bring them out and take them to hospitals. It was gruesome work. There are about 30 still in hospitals and more may die."

It was estimated that few among Natchez' negro families were unaffected. This city has a population of about 16,000, of which approximately 60 per cent is negro.

STATE TREASURER CANDIDATE VISITS

Al Brown, democratic candidate for state treasurer, put into Klamath Falls on a southern Oregon campaigning voyage Wednesday. Brown called on various county officials and others in the democratic party, seeking support in his forthcoming election contest.

Brown is Multnomah county auditor. He said it is his opinion that any money that can be saved in public administration should go to pensions for the aged and relief for the needy "rather than be squandered or mismanaged in incompetent administration."

"People in public life," said Brown, "should earn their salaries and understand the duties of their offices and not be just office drones."

He is a native of Minnesota and has lived in Oregon since 1913.

runways. Several fires were started and a large explosion occurred.

"North of Sylt a number of enemy patrol vessels were encountered. These opened heavy anti-aircraft fire on our planes. They were immediately attacked and two were sunk."

The prime minister in his brief speech to the house announced that Sir Walter Monckton, former director of the press censorship bureau, would assume immediate direction of propaganda in neutral and enemy countries.

Butler told commons that any trade negotiations with Russia would take care of Britain's paramount object of preventing war supplies from reaching Germany.

Still to be considered in parliament was the \$10,000,000,000 budget, containing new tax measures, which was submitted yesterday by the chancellor of the exchequer, Sir John Simon.

The public, as well as parliament, accepted calmly the government's proposals to take at least five-eighths of the nation's purchasing power to finance the war efforts.

Warfare on Britain's shores took a further toll of shipping. The British steamer Lolworth sank off the southeast coast yesterday when it struck a mine. Another vessel was reported mined in the same area, but a coastal lifeboat crew found no traces of wreckage.

KLAMATH ENTRIES IN N. Y. EXHIBITION

Seven entries from Klamath Falls are to be shown in the fifth annual "Young America Paints" exhibition at the American museum of natural history in New York, opening April 27 and continuing through May 12.

The local entries show work of Billy Wilson, Harvey Teal and Malcolm Epley Jr., all of Fremont school, and Dorothy Collier, Dick Blackmer and Marianne Lion, Roosevelt school. The Fremont students are taught by Vera Pearson and the art teacher at Roosevelt is Etta Mather.

The exhibition is sponsored by a committee of directors of art education in the public school systems and by Dr. Charles Russell, curator of education at the museum. It will be open to the public free of charge weekdays from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m. and Sundays from 1 p. m. to 5 p. m.

The schools have entered paintings by children from kindergarten through high school age. Media used includes chalk, water color, fresco, tempera, powder paint, finger paint, crayon and pen and ink.

The majority of subjects are related to the things the children enjoy most in their every day life, some treated realistically, others with a droll twist of humor. Love of airplanes seems to have replaced the traditional enthusiasm for locomotives. A scattered group of entries indicates that the surrealists may have turned to children's art for inspiration. The finger paintings lean toward abstractions, which give psychologists and psychiatrists a telling insight into childish problems.
