CHANGES MADE IN 4-H AWARDS

A little different system of awards is being used at the 4-H Spring Fair this year. It was decided to use a modified version of the Danish system wherein an approximate percentage of the exhibitors in each division place in each of the blue, red, and white ribbon groups. For example, in the cooking 1-A division of exhibits there will be awarded a summer school scholarship in the blue ribbon class, three summer camp scholarships in the red ribbon class, and two half-scholarships in the white ribbon class which makes a total of six awards in three groups rather than placing the exhibits as first, second, third and so on through the sixth or seventh place.

Awards given this year are all state fair trips, summer school scholarships, summer camp scholarships and summer camp half-scholarships rather than small sums of money that are easily spent and forgotten about. These awards are provided by the county fair board. Total number of scholarships to be awarded are seven state fair scholarships, 28 summer school scholarships, 84 summer camp scholarships, and 42 summer camp half-scholarships.
